5 For the voice of my groaning : my bones will scarce cleave to my flesh.  
6 I am become like a pelican in the wil-derness : and like an owl that is in the  
desert.  
7 I have watched, and am even as it were a sparrow : that sitteth alone up-on the  
housetop.  
8 Mine enemies revile me all the day long : and they that are mad upon me are  
sworn to-ge-ther against me.  
9 For I have eaten ash-es as it were bread : and mingled my drink with weeping.  
10 And that because of thine indig-nation and wrath : for thou hast taken me up,  
and cast me down.  
11 My days are gone like a shadow : and I am wi-ther-ed like grass.  
12 But thou, O Lord, shalt en-dure for ever : and thy remembrance throughout

13 Thou shalt arise, and have mercy upon Sion : for it is time that thou have

14 And why ? thy servants think up-on her stones : and it pitieth them to see her

15 The nations shall fear thy Name, O Lord : and all the kings of the earth thy  
Majesty ;

16 When the Lord shall build up Sion : and when his glo-ry shall appear ;

17 When he turneth him unto the prayer of the poor des-titute : and des-pis-eth  
not their desire.

18 This shall be written for those that come after : and the people which shall be  
born shall praise the Lord.

19 For he hath looked down from his sanctu-ary : out of the heaven did the Lord  
behold the earth ;

20 That he might hear the mournings of such as are in cap-ti-vity : and deliver  
them that are ap-point-ed unto death ;

21 That they may declare the Name of the Lord in Sion : and his wor-ship at Je-  
rusalem ;

22 When the people are gather-ed to-gether : and the kingdoms al-so, to serve  
the Lord.

23 He brought down my strength in my journey : and shor-ten-ed my days.

24 But I said, O my God, take me not away in the midst of mine age : as for thy  
years, they endure throughout all ge-nerations.

25 Thou, Lord, in the beginning hast laid the foun-dation of the earth : and the

heavens are the work of thy hands.

26 They shall perish, but thou shalt endure : they all shall wax old as doth a garment ;

27 And as a vesture shalt thou change them, and they shall be changed : but thou art the same, and thy years shall not fail.

28 The children of thy servants shall continue : and their seed shall stand fast in thy sight.

5 Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things : making thee young and lusty as an eagle.

6 The Lord executeth righteousness and judgement : for all them that are oppressed with wrong.

7 He shewed his ways unto Moses : his works unto the children of Israel.

8 The Lord is full of compassion and mercy : long-suffering, and of great goodness.

9 He will not always be chiding : neither keepeth he his anger for ever.

10 He hath not dealt with us after our sins : nor rewarded us according to our wickednesses.

11 For look how high the heaven is in comparison of the earth : so great is his

mercy also to-ward them that fear him.

12 Look how wide also the east is from the west : so far hath he set our sins from us.

13 Yea, like as a father pitieth his own children : even so is the Lord merciful unto them that fear him.

14 For he knoweth where-of we are made : he remember-eth that we are but dust.

15 The days of man are but as grass : for he flourisheth as a flower of the field.

16 For as soon as the wind goeth over it, it is gone : and the place thereof shall know it no more.

17 But the merciful goodness of the Lord endureth for ever and ever upon them that fear him : and his righteousness up-on children's children ;

18 Even upon such as keep his covenant : and think upon his commandments to do them.

19 The Lord hath prepared his seat in heaven : and his kingdom ruleth over all.

20 O praise the Lord, ye angels of his, ye that excel in strength : ye that fulfil his commandment, and hearken unto the voice of his words.

21 O praise the Lord, all ye his hosts : ye servants of his that do his pleasure.

22 O speak good of the Lord, all ye works of his, in all places of his dominion : praise thou the Lord, O my soul.



glorious ; thou art clothed with ma-jes-ty and honour.

2 Thou deckest thyself with light as it were with a garment : and spreadest out  
the hea-vens like a curtain.

3 Who layeth the beams of his chambers in the waters : and maketh the clouds  
his chariot, and walketh up-on the wings of the wind.

4 He maketh his angels spirits : and his mi-nis-ters a flaming fire.

5 He laid the foun-dations of the earth : that it never should move at any time.

6 Thou coveredst it with the deep, like as with a garment : the wa-ters stand in  
the hills.

7 At thy re-buke they flee : at the voice of thy thun-der they are afraid.

8 They go up as high as the hills, and down to the valleys beneath : even unto the  
place which thou hast ap-point-ed for them.

9 Thou hast set them their bounds which they shall not pass : neither turn again  
to co-ver the earth.

10 He sendeth the springs in-to the rivers : which run among the hills.

11 All beasts of the field drink there-of : and the wild ass-es quench their thirst.

12 Beside them shall the fowls of the air have their habi-tation : and sing a-mong  
the branches.

- 13 He watereth the hills from above : the earth is filled with the fruit of thy works.
- 14 He bringeth forth grass for the cattle : and green herb for the ser-vice of men ;
- 15 That he may bring food out of the earth, and wine that maketh glad the heart  
of man : and oil to make him a cheerful countenance, and bread to streng-then  
man's heart.
- 16 The trees of the Lord al-so are full of sap : even the cedars of Libanus which  
he hath planted ;
- 17 Wherein the birds make their nests : and the fir-trees are a dwel-ling for the  
stork.
- 18 The high hills are a refuge for the wild goats : and so are the stony rocks for  
the conies.
- 19 He appointed the moon for certain seasons : and the sun know-eth his going  
down.
- 20 Thou makest darkness that it may be night : wherein all the beasts of the for-  
est do move.
- 21 The lions, roaring after their prey : do seek their meat from God.
- 22 The sun ariseth, and they get them a-way to-gether : and lay them down in  
their dens.
- 23 Man goeth forth to his work, and to his labour : un-til the evening.
- 24 O Lord, how ma-nifold are thy works : in wisdom hast thou made them all ;  
the earth is full of thy riches.
- 25 So is the great and wide sea also : wherein are things creeping innumerable,  
both small and great beasts.
- 26 There go the ships, and there is that Le-vi-athan : whom thou hast made to

take his <sup>4 15678 23</sup>pas-time therein.

27 These wait <sup>347 12568</sup>all up-on thee : that thou mayest give them <sup>457 168 23</sup>meat in due season.

28 When thou givest it <sup>347</sup>them they <sup>258 16</sup>ga-ther it : and when thou openest thy hand  
<sup>4 15678 23</sup>they are fil-led with good.

29 When thou hidest thy face <sup>347 12568</sup>they are troubled : when thou takest away their  
breath they die, and are turned <sup>4 15678 23</sup>a-gain to their dust.

30 When thou lettest thy breath go <sup>347</sup>forth they <sup>258 16</sup>shall be made : and thou shalt re-  
<sup>4 168 2357</sup>new the face of the earth.

31 The glorious Majesty of the Lord shall <sup>347 12568</sup>en-dure for ever : the Lord shall <sup>4 168</sup>re-  
<sup>2357</sup>joice in his works.


32 The earth shall tremble <sup>347 258 16</sup>at the look of him : if he do but touch the hills, they  
shall smoke.

33 I will sing unto the Lord <sup>347 12568</sup>as long as I live : I will praise my God while I have  
<sup>23</sup>my being.

34 And so shall my words <sup>347 12568</sup>please him : my joy shall be in the Lord.

35 As for sinners, they shall be consumed out of the earth, and the ungodly shall  
<sup>347 12568</sup>come to an end : praise thou the Lord, <sup>4 168 2357</sup>O my soul, praise the Lord.

*Psalm 105. Confitemini Domino. civ.*

 <sup>347 258 16</sup>give thanks unto the Lord, and call up-on his Name : tell the people what  
<sup>15678 23</sup>things he hath done.

2 O let your songs be <sup>347 12568</sup>of him, and praise him : and let your talking be <sup>4 15678 23</sup>of all his  
wondrous works.

3 Rejoice in his <sup>347 258 16</sup>ho-ly Name : let the heart of them <sup>4 15678 23</sup>re-joyce that seek the Lord.

4 Seek the Lord and his <sup>4 37 258 16</sup>strength : seek his <sup>4 168 2357</sup>face evermore.

5 Remember the marvellous works that he hath done : his wonders, and the judge-ments of his mouth,

6 O ye seed of Abra-ham his servant : ye children of Ja-cob his chosen.

7 He is the Lord our God : his judge-ments are in all the world.

8 He hath been alway mindful of his cove-nant and promise : that he made to a thou-sand ge-nerations ;

9 Even the covenant that he made with A-braham : and the oath that he sware un-to Isaac ;

10 And appointed the same unto Jacob for a law : and to Israel for an ev-er-last-ing testament ;

11 Saying, Unto thee will I give the land of Canaan : the lot of your inheritance ;

12 When there were yet but a few of them : and they stran-gers in the land ;

13 What time as they went from one nation to an-other : from one kingdom to an-o-ther people ;

14 He suffered no man to do them wrong : but reprov'd e-ven kings for their sakes ;

15 Touch not mine A-nointed : and do my pro-phets no harm.

16 Moreover, he called for a dearth up-on the land : and destroyed all the pro-vi-sion of bread.

17 But he had sent a man be-fore them : even Joseph, who was sold to be a bond-servant ;

18 Whose feet they hurt in the stocks : the iron enter-ed in-to his soul ;

19 Until the time came that his cause was known : the word of the Lord tried him.

20 The king sent, and de-liver-ed him : the prince of the peo-ple let him go free.  
21 He made him lord al-so of his house : and ruler of all his substance ;  
22 That he might inform his princes after his will : and teach his se-na-tors wis-  
dom.

23 Israel also came into Egypt : and Jacob was a stran-ger in the land of Ham.  
24 And he increased his peo-ple ex-ceed-ingly : and made them stron-ger than  
their enemies ;  
25 Whose heart turned so, that they ha-ted his people : and dealt untru-ly with  
his servants.

26 Then sent he Mo-ses his servant : and Aaron whom he had chosen.  
27 And these shewed his to-kens a-mong them : and won-ders in the land of  
Ham.

28 He sent dark-ness, and it was dark : and they were not obedi-ent un-to his  
word.

29 He turned their wa-ters in-to blood : — — and slew their fish.  
30 Their land brought forth frogs : yea, even in their kings' chambers.  
31 He spake the word, and there came all manner of flies : and lice in all their  
quarters.

32 He gave them hail-stones for rain : and flames of fire in their land.  
33 He smote their vines al-so and fig-trees : and destroyed the trees that were in  
their coasts.

34 He spake the word, and the grasshoppers came, and caterpillars in-numer-able :  
and did eat up all the grass in their land, and devoured the fruit of their ground.  
35 He smote all the first-born in their land : even the chief of all their strength.

36 He brought them forth also with silver and gold : there was not one feeble  
per-son a-mong their tribes.

37 Egypt was glad at their de-parting : for they were afraid of them.

38 He spread out a cloud to be a co-vering : and fire to give light in the night-  
season.

39 At their de-sire he brought quails : and he filled them with the bread of  
heaven.

40 He opened the rock of stone, and the waters flow-ed out : so that rivers ran in  
the dry places.

41 For why ? he remembered his holy promise : and A-bra-ham his servant.


42 And he brought forth his people with joy : and his cho-sen with gladness ;

43 And gave them the lands of the heathen : and they took the labours of the  
peo-ple in possession ;

44 That they might keep his statutes : — and observe his laws.



 give thanks unto the Lord, for he is gracious : and his mercy en-dur-eth  
for ever.

2 Who can express the noble acts of the Lord : or shew forth all his praise ?

3 Blessed are they that al-way keep judgement : — and do righteousness.

4 Remember me, O Lord, according to the favour that thou bearest un-to thy  
people : O visit me with thy salvation ;

5 That I may see the felicity of thy chosen : and rejoice in the gladness of thy  
people, and give thanks with thine inheritance.

6 We have sinned with our fathers : we have done a-miss, and dealt wickedly.

7 Our fathers regarded not thy wonders in Egypt, neither kept they thy great  
goodness in re-membrance : but were disobedient at the sea, e-ven at the Red sea.

8 Nevertheless, he helped them for his Name's sake : that he might make his  
pow-er to be known.

9 He rebuked the Red sea also, and it was dri-ed up : so he led them through the  
deep, as through a wilderness.

10 And he saved them from the adver-sa-ry's hand : and delivered them from the  
hand of the enemy.

11 As for those that troubled them, the waters over-whelm-ed them : there was  
not one of them left.

12 Then be-lieved they his words : and sang praise unto him.

13 But within a while they for-gat his works : and would not a-bide his counsel.

14 But lust came upon them in the wil-derness : and they tempted God in the  
desert.

- 15 And he <sup>347</sup>gave <sup>258</sup>them <sup>16</sup>their desire : and sent leanness with-al into their soul. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>
- 16 They <sup>347</sup>angered <sup>258</sup>Moses <sup>16</sup>also in the tents : and <sup>4 168 2357</sup>Aa-ron the saint of the Lord.
- 17 So the earth opened, and swallow-ed up <sup>347 12568</sup>Dathan : and covered the congrega-  
<sup>4 15678 23</sup>tion of Abiram.
- 18 And the fire was kindled <sup>347 258 16</sup>in their com-pany : the flame burnt up the <sup>457 168 23</sup>ungodly.
- 19 They <sup>347 12568</sup>made a calf in Horeb : and worshipped the <sup>4 15678 23</sup>mol-ten image.
- 20 Thus they <sup>37 4 12568</sup>turn-ed their glory : into the similitude of a calf that eateth hay. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>
- 21 And they <sup>347 12568</sup>forgot God their Saviour : who had done so great things in Egypt ; <sup>4 15678 23</sup>
- 22 Wondrous works in the land of Ham : and fearful things by the Red sea. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>
- 23 So he said, he would have destroyed them, had not Moses his chosen stood  
<sup>347 258 16</sup>be-fore him in the gap : to turn away his wrathful indignation, lest he should de-  
stroy them. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>
- 24 Yea, they thought scorn of that <sup>347 258 16</sup>plea-sant land : and gave no <sup>4 168 2357</sup>cre-dence unto  
his word ;
- 25 But <sup>37 4 258 16</sup>mur-mured in their tents : and hearkened not un-to the voice of the Lord. <sup>4 168 2357</sup>
- 26 Then lift he up his hand <sup>347 12568</sup>a-gainst them : to overthrow them in the wilderness ; <sup>4 15678 23</sup>
- 27 To cast out their seed <sup>347 12568</sup>a-mong the nations : and to scat-ter them in the lands. <sup>457 168 23</sup>
- 28 They joined themselves unto <sup>347 12568</sup>Baal-peor : and ate the <sup>457 168 23</sup>of-fer-ings of the dead.
- 29 Thus they provoked him to anger with their own <sup>347 12568</sup>in-ventions : and the plague  
<sup>4 15678 23</sup>was great among them.
- 30 Then stood up <sup>347 12568</sup>Phine-es, and <sup>457 168 23</sup>prayed : and so the plague ceased.
- 31 And that was counted unto <sup>347 258 16</sup>him for righ-teousness : among all <sup>4 15678 23</sup>poste-ri-ties for  
evermore.
- 32 They angered him also at the <sup>347 12568</sup>waters of strife : so that he punish-ed <sup>4 15678 23</sup>Mo-ses

for their sakes ;

33 Because they pro-vok-ed<sup>37 4 12568</sup> his spirit : so that he spake unad-vis-ed-ly<sup>457 168 23</sup> with his lips.

34 Neither destroyed they the heathen : as the Lord commanded them ;

35 But were mingled a-mong the heathen : and learn-ed<sup>347 12568 4 15678 23</sup> their works.

36 Insomuch that they worshipped their idols, which turned<sup>347 258 16</sup> to their own decay : yea, they offered their sons and their daugh-ters un-to<sup>4 15678 23</sup> devils ;

37 And shed innocent blood, even the blood of their sons and of their daughters : whom they offered unto the idols of Canaan ; and the land was de-fil-ed<sup>4 15678 23</sup> with blood.

38 Thus were they stained with their own works : and went a whoring with their<sup>347 12568 4</sup> own inventions.<sup>15678 23</sup>

39 Therefore was the wrath of the Lord kindled a-gainst<sup>347 12568</sup> his people : insomuch that he abhorred his own inheritance.<sup>4 15678 23</sup>

40 And he gave them over into the hand of the heathen : and they that hated<sup>37 4 12568</sup> them were lords over them.<sup>4 168 2357</sup>

41 Their ene-mies op-pres-sed<sup>347 258 16</sup> them : and had them in subjection.<sup>4 15678 23</sup>

42 Many a time did he de-liv-er<sup>347 258 16</sup> them : but they rebelled against him with their own inventions, and were brought down<sup>4 15678 23</sup> in their wickedness.

43 Nevertheless, when he saw their ad-ver-sity : — he heard their complaint.<sup>347 258 16 4 168 2357</sup>


44 He thought upon his covenant, and pitied them, according unto the multitude<sup>347 12568</sup> of his mercies : yea, he made all those that led them away cap-tive<sup>457 168 23</sup> to pity them.

45 Deliver us, O Lord our God, and gather us from a-mong the heathen : that we may give thanks unto thy holy Name, and make our boast of thy praise.<sup>4 15678 23</sup>

46 Blessed be the Lord God of Israel from everlasting, and world with-out end :<sup>347 12568</sup>

and let all the <sup>457 168 23</sup>peo-ple say, Amen.

 give thanks unto the Lord, for he is <sup>347 12568</sup>gracious : and his mercy <sup>457 168</sup>en-dur-eth <sup>23</sup>for ever.

20 He sent his word, and heal-ed them : and they were saved from their destruction.

21 O that men would therefore praise the Lord for his goodness : and declare the wonders that he doeth for the chil-dren of men !

22 That they would offer unto him the sacrifice of thanks-giving : and tell out his works with gladness !

23 They that go down to the sea in ships : and occupy their busi-ness in great waters ;

24 These men see the works of the Lord : and his won-ders in the deep.

25 For at his word the stormy wind a-riseth : which lift-eth up the waves thereof.

26 They are carried up to the heaven, and down a-gain to the deep : their soul

melteth away be-cause of the trouble.

27 They reel to and fro, and stagger <sup>347 258 16</sup> like a drunk-en man : and are at their wit's end.

29 For he mak-eth the storm to cease : so that the waves thereof are still.

30 Then are they glad, be-cause they <sup>347 258 16</sup> are at rest : and so he bringeth them unto the ha-ven <sup>457 168 23</sup> where they would be.

31 O that men would therefore praise the Lord <sup>347 12568</sup> for his goodness : and declare the wonders that he doeth for the chil-dren of men !

32 That they would exalt him also in the congregation of the people : and praise him in the seat of the elders ! <sup>457 168 23</sup>

33 Who turneth the floods <sup>37 4 258 16</sup> in-to a wil-derness : and dri-eth up the watersprings. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>

34 A fruitful land mak-eth he barren : for the wickedness of them that dwell therein.

35 Again, he maketh the wilderness a standing water : and water-springs of a dry ground.

36 And there he set-teth the hungry : that they may build them a ci-ty to dwell in ; <sup>37 4 12568 457 168 23</sup>

37 That they may sow their land, and plant vineyards : to yield them fruits of increase.

38 He blesseth them, so that they multi-ply <sup>347 258 16</sup> ex-ceed-ingly : and suffereth not their cat-tle to decrease. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>

39 And again, when they are minish-ed <sup>347 12568</sup> and brought low : through oppression,

through a-ny plague or trouble ;

40 Though he suffer them to be evil in-treat-ed through tyrants : and let them wander out of the way in the wilderness ;



9 Let his children be vaga-bonds, and beg their bread : let them seek it also out of de-so-late places.

10 Let the extortioner consume all that he hath : and let the stran-ger spoil his labour.

11 Let there be no man to pi-ty him : nor to have compassion upon his fa-ther-less children.

12 Let his posterity be des-troyed : and in the next generation let his name be clean put out.

13 Let the wickedness of his fathers be had in remembrance in the sight of the Lord : and let not the sin of his mo-ther be done away.

- 6 They have corrupted themselves, their spot is not the spot of his <sup>37 4</sup>children : <sup>12568</sup>  
they are a perverse and crook-ed <sup>4</sup>ge-<sup>15678 23</sup>neration.
- 7 Do ye thus requite the Lord, O foolish <sup>347</sup>people and <sup>258 16</sup>unwise : is not he thy Father  
that hath bought thee ? hath he not made thee, and es-tab-lished thee ? <sup>4</sup>  
<sup>15678 23</sup>
- 8 Remember the days of old, consider the years of many <sup>347</sup>gene-<sup>12568</sup>rations : ask thy  
father, and he will shew thee ; thy elders, and they will tell thee. <sup>4</sup>

- 9 When the most High divided to the nations their in-he-ritance : when he sepa-

17 But Jeshurun waxed <sup>347</sup>fat, and <sup>12568</sup>kicked : thou art waxen fat, thou art grown thick,  
thou art <sup>4 15678 23</sup>co-ver-ed with fatness ;

18 Then he forsook <sup>347</sup>God which <sup>12568</sup>made him : and lightly <sup>4 15678</sup>esteemed the Rock of his  
<sup>23</sup>salvation.

19 They provoked him to <sup>347</sup>jealou-sy with <sup>12568</sup>strange gods : with abominations pro-  
<sup>4 15678 23</sup>voked they him to anger.

32 Were it not that I feared the wrath <sup>37 4 258 16</sup> of the en-emy : lest their adversaries  
should be-have them-selves <sup>457 168 23</sup> strangely :

33 And lest they should say, Our hand <sup>347 258 16</sup> is high : and the Lord <sup>4 15678 23</sup> hath not done all  
this.

34 For they are a nation void of counsel : neither is there any <sup>347 12568 4 15678 23</sup> un-der-stand-ing in  
them.

35 O that they were wise, that they <sup>347 12568</sup> un-der-stood this : that they would con-si-  
<sup>168 23</sup>der their latter end !

36 How should one chase a thousand, and two put ten thousand to flight : except  
their Rock had sold them, and the Lord <sup>4 15678 23</sup> had shut them up ?

37 For their rock is not as our Rock : even our enemies them-selves <sup>347 12568 4 15678 23</sup> be-ing  
judges.

38 For their vine is of the vine of Sodom : and of the fields <sup>347 12568 457 168 23</sup> of Gomorrah.

39 Their grapes are grapes of gall : their clus-ters <sup>347 258 16 457 168 23</sup> are bitter.

40 Their wine is the poi-son of dragons : and the cru-el <sup>37 4 12568 4 15678 23</sup> ve-nom of asps.

41 Is not this laid up in store with me, and sealed up <sup>347 12568</sup> a-mong my treasures : to me  
<sup>457 168 23</sup>belongeth ven-geance and recompense.

42 Their foot shall slide in due time ; for the day of their cala-mi-ty is at hand :  
and the things that shall come up-on them make haste.

43 For the Lord shall judge his people, and repent himself for his servants : when  
he seeth that their power is gone, and there is none shut up, or left.

44 And he shall say, Where are their gods, their rock in whom they trusted :  
which did eat the fat of their sacrifices, and drank the wine of their drink offerings ?  
let them rise up and help you, and be your protection.

45 See now that I, even I, am he : and there is no god with me.

46 I kill, and I make alive ; I wound and I heal : neither is there any that can deli-  
ver out of my hand.

47 For I lift up my hand to heaven : and say, I live for ever.

48 If I whet my glittering sword, and mine hand take hold on judgement : I will  
render vengeance to mine enemies, and I will re-ward them that hate me.

49 I will make mine arrows drunk with blood : and my sword shall devour flesh.

50 And that with the blood of the slain and of the captives : from the beginning  
of revenges up-on the enemy.

51 Rejoice, O ye nations, with his people : for he will avenge the blood of his ser-  
vants ;
