Psalm 53. Dixit insipiens. liij.

THe foolish body hāth sâid ín his heart : Thère ís no God.

2. Corrupt are they, and become abominable ín their wíckedness : there ís nône that dóeth good.

3. God looked down from heaven upon the chîldren óf men : to see if there were any that would understānd, and sêek áfter God.

4. But they are all gone out of the way, they are altogether become abômináble : there is also none that dôeth gôod, nó not one.

5. Are not they without understāding thāt work wíckedness : eat-

ing up my people as if they would eat bread ? they have not cālléd upón God.

6. They were afraid whêre no féar was : for God hath broken the bones of him that besieged thee ; thou hast put them to confusion, because Gôd hath despísed them.

7. O that the salvation were given unto Israel óut of Síon : O that the Lord would deliver his people óut of captívity !

8. Then should Jácob réjoice : and Isrâel should bé right glad.

6. An offering of a free heart will I give thee, and práise thy Náme, O Lord : because it is sō cômfortáble.

7. For he hath delivered me out of áll my trouble : and mine eye hath seen his desire ūpôn mine é-nemies.

10. Day and night they go about with in the walls thereof : mischief also and sorrow are in the midst of it.

11. Wickedness is therein : deceit and guile go not out of their streets.

12. For it is not an open enemy, that hath done me this dishonour : for then I could have borne it.

13. Neither was it mine adversary, that did magnify himself against me : for then peradventure I would have hid myself from him.

14. But it was even thou, my companion : my guide, and mine own familiar friend.

15. We took sweet counsel together :

and walked in the house of God as friends.

16. Let death come hastily upon them, and let them go down quick into hell : for wickedness is in their dwellings, and among them.

17. As for me, I will call upon God : and the Lord shall save me.

18. In the evening, and morning, and at noon-day will I pray, and that instantly : and he shall hear my voice.

19. It is he that hath delivered my soul in peace from the battle that was against me : for there were many with me.

20. Yea, even God, that endureth for ever, shall hear me, and bring them down : for they will not turn, nor fear God.

21. He laid his hands upon such as be at peace with him : and he brake his covenant.

22. The words of his mouth were softer than butter, having war in his heart : his words were smoother than oil, and yet be they very swords.

23. O cast thy burden upon the Lord, and he shall nourish thee : and shall not suffer the righteous to fall for ever.

24. And as for them : thou, O God, shalt bring them into the pit of destruction.

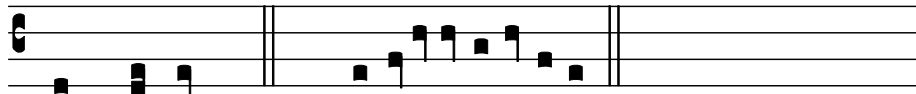

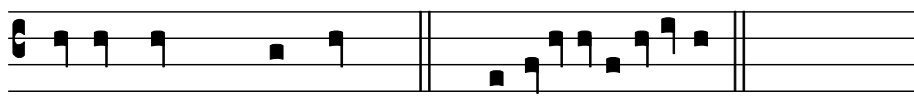

ARe your minds set upon righteousness, O ye cōngregátion : and do ye judge the thing that is ríght, Ô ye sóns of men ?

2. Yea, ye imagine mischief in your hêart upón the earth : and your hānds déal with wíckedness.

3. The ungodly are froward, even frōm their móther's womb : as soon as they are born, they go āstrây, and speák lies.

4. They are as venomous as the poison ôf a sérpent : even like the deaf adder thāt stōppeth hér ears.

5. Which refuseth to hear the vōice ôf the chármer : charm he nêver so wíselly.

6. Break their teeth, O God, in their mouths ; smite the jaw-bones of

the líons, Ó Lord : Let them fall away like water that runneth apace ; when they shoot their arrows lē t thēm be rootēd out.

7. Let them consume away like a snail, and be like the untimely frúit ôf a wóman : and lē t them nôt sée the sun.

8. Or ever your pôts bē made hót with thorns : so let indignation vex him, even ās a thíng thát is raw.

9. The righteous shall rejoice when he sêth the véngence : he shall wash his footsteps in the blood ôf thē ungodly.

10. So that a man shall say, Verily there is a rewârd fōr the ríghteous : doubtless there is a God thāt júdgeth thé earth.

Psalm 59. Eripe me de inimicis. lvij.

Deliver me from mine ênemiés, O God : defend me from them that ríse ûp agáinst me.

2. O deliver me from the wícked dóers : and save me frōm the blōd-thírstly men.

3. For lo, they lie wáiting fór my soul : the mighty men are gathered agáinst me, without any offence ôr fáult of mé, O Lord.

4. They run and prepare themselves without my fault : arise thou therefore tō hêlp me, ánd behold.

5. Stand up, O Lord God of hosts, thou God of Israel, to visit áll the héathen : and be not merciful unto them that offend of málícious wíckedness.

6. They go to and fro ín the évening : they grin like a dog, and run aboût thròugh the cíty.

7. Behold, they speak with their mouth, and swórd are ín their lips : fōr whó doth hear ?

8. But thou, O Lord, shalt have them ín derísion : and thou shalt

laugh all thē hēathen tó scorn.

9. My strength will I āscrîbe únto thee : for thou art the Gôd of my réfuge.

10. God sheweth me his gôôdness plénteously : and God shall let me see my desire úpôn mine énemies.

11. Slay them not, lest my peôplē forgét it : but scatter them abroad among the people, and put them dōwn, O Lôrd, our defence.

12. For the sin of their mouth, and for the words of their lips, they shall be tâken ín their pride : and why ? their preaching is ôf cûrsing ánd lies.

13. Consume them in thy wrath, consume them, that thêy may pérish :

and know that it is God that ruleth in Jacob, and untō the ênds óf the world.

14. And in the êvenīng they wíll return : grin like a dog, and will go ābôut the cítý.

15. They will run hêre and thére for meat : and grudge if they be nôt sâ-tisfied.

16. As for me, I will sing of thy power, and will praise thy mercy be-times ín the mórning : for thou hast been my defence and refuge in the dâý of my tróuble.

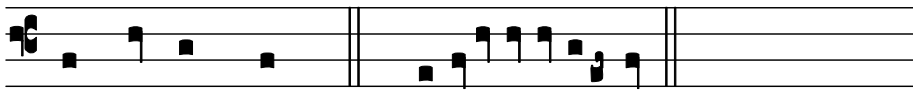

untõ thôse that féar thy Name.

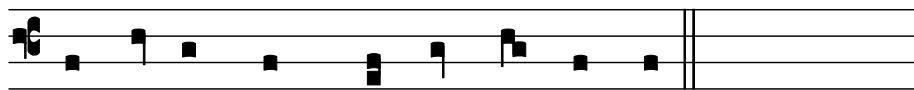

2. He verily is my strength and my salvation : he is my defence, so that I shall not greatly fall.

3. How long will ye imagine mischief against every man : ye shall be slain all the sort of you ; yea, as a tottering wall shall ye be, and like a broken hedge.

4. Their device is only how to put him out whom God will exalt : their delight is in lies ; they give good words with their mouth, but curse with their heart.

5. Nevertheless, my soul, wait thou still upon God : for my hope is in him.

6. He truly is my strength and my salvation : he is my defence, so that I shall not fall.

7. In God is my health, and my glory : the rock of my might, and in God is my trust.

8. O put your trust in him always, ye people : pour out your hearts before him, for God is our hope.

9. As for the children of men, they are but vanity : the children of men are deceitful upon the weights, they are altogether lighter than vanity itself.

10. O trust not in wrong and robbery, give not yourselves unto vanity : if riches increase, set not your heart upon them.

11. God spake once, and twice I have also heard the same : that power belongeth unto God ;

12. And that thou, Lord, art merciful : for thou rewardest every man according to his work.

The following Psalm is not sung at the Nocturns. Psalm 63. Deus Deus meus. lxij.



God, thou art my God : early will I seek thee.

2. My soul thirsteth for thee, my flesh also longeth after thee : in a

barren and dry land where no water is.

3. Thus have I looked for thee in holiness : that I might behold thy power and glory.

4. For thy loving-kindness is better than the life itself : my lips shall praise thee.

5. As long as I live will I magnify thee on this manner : and lift up my hands in thy Name.

6. My soul shall be satisfied, even as it were with marrow and fatness : when my mouth praiseth thee with joyful lips.

7. Have I not remembered thee in my bed : and thought upon thee when I was waking ?

8. Because thou hast been my helper : therefore under the shadow of

thy wings will I rejoice.

9. My soul hangeth upon thee : thy right hand hath upholden me.

10. These also that seek the hurt of my soul : they shall go under the earth.

11. Let them fall upon the edge of the sword : that they may be a portion for foxes.

12. But the King shall rejoice in God ; all they also that swear by him shall be commended : for the mouth of them that speak lies shall be stopped.

Psalm 64. Exaudi Deus. lxiiij.

Hear my voice, O God, in my prayer : preserve my life from fear of the enemy.

2. Hide me from the gathering together of the forward : and from the insurrection of wicked doers ;

3. Who have whet their tongue like a sword : and shoot out their arrows, even bitter words ;

4. That they may privily shoot at him that is perfect : suddenly do they hit him, and fear not.

5. They encourage themselves in mischief : and commune among themselves, how they may lay snares, and say, that no man shall see them.

6. They imagine wickedness, and practise it : that they keep secret a-

mong themselves, every man in the deep of his heart.


7. But God shall suddenly shoot at them with a swift arrow : that they shall be wounded.


8. Yea, their own tongues shall make them fall : insomuch that who-so seeth them shall laugh them to scorn.


9. And all men that see it shall say, This hath God done : for they shall perceive that it is his work.

ungodly perish at thē prêsence óf God.

3. But let the righteous be glad, and
rejôice befóre God : let them also be
mērry and jôyful.

4. O sing unto God, and sing prâis-
ēs untó his Name : magnify him that
rideth upon the heavens, as it were
upon an horse ; praise him in his
Name JAH, and rējôice befóre him.

5. He is a Father of the fatherless,
and defendeth the câuse óf the wí-

dows : even God in his holỹ hâbitá-
tion.

6. He is the God that maketh men
to be of one mind in an house, and
bringeth the prisoners out óf captí-
vity : but letteth the runagates conti-
nue in scârceness.

7. O God, when thou wentest forth
befóre the péuple : when thou went-
est thróugh the wildernes,

8. The earth shook, and the
heavens dropped at the prêsence óf
God : even as Sinai also was moved at
the presence of God, who is thē Gôd
of Ísrael.

9. Thou, O God, sentest a gracious
rain upôn thīne inhéritance : and

refreshedst it whēn it was weáry.

10. Thy congregátion shall dwéll therein : for thou, O God, hast of thy goodness prēpáred fôr the poor.

11. Thē Lôrd gáve the word : great was the companỹ ôf the préachers.

12. Kings with their armies did flee, and wêre discómfited : and they of the household dīvīded thé spoil.

13. Though ye have lien among the sheep-folds, yet shall ye be as thē wíngs óf a dove : that is covered with silver wings, and hēr féathers líke gold.

14. When the Almighty scatterēd kǐngs fôr their sake : then were they as white ās snôw in Sálmon.

15. As the hill of Basan, sô is Gód's hill : even an high hill, as thē hǐll of B́asan.

16. Why hop ye so, ye high hills ? this is God's hill, in the which it pléaseth hím to dwell : yea, the Lord will abide ĩn it for éver.

17. The chariots of God are twenty thousand, even thóusānds of ángels : and the Lord is among them as in the holỹ pláce of Sínai.

18. Thou art gone up on high, thou hast led captivity captive, and recēived gífts for men : yea, even for thine enemies, that the Lord God mǐght dwéll amóng them.

19. Praised bê thē Lord dáily : even the God who helpeth us, and poureth

his benēfĭts upón us.

20. He is our God, even the God of whom cômēth salvátion : God is the Lord, by whôm we escápe death.
