Let this order be preserved on all Saturdays at Vespers until the Ascension of the Lord, namely of the Antiphon on the Psalms and the Chapter and the Hymn, and the Versicle when the service is of the Sunday.



Rant, we beseech thee, almighty God: that we who have fulfilled the Paschal feast days: may by thy

bounty hold them fast in our habits and life. Through Jesus Christ.

No longer let a Procession be made to the Font with Oil and Chrism as on the preceding days: but only before the Cross, with the Taperers and Thurifers in Albs: and the boy bearing the Book before the Priest in a Surplice and without a Cross: singing at the Procession the Antiphon Christ being raised. 1464. with the Rulers of the Choir beginning together. Let two Clerks of the Superior Grade, before the entrance to the Quire: in Surplices facing the clergy: this day and on the Sunday next before the Ascension of the Lord: together sing the Verse Let the Jews. 1465. Let it be made likewise on Double Feasts that fall on Sundays or on Saturdays. But on the intermediary Sundays let it be sung by two of the ij. Form, in the aforesaid place and vestment. Then after the censing of the Crucifix let the Priest say.

Further note that the Antiphon on the Psalms is sung until the Feast of the Holy Trinity.










A Homily of Blessed Gregory, Pope. xxvj.

He first question that striketh the mind in the reading of this Gospel: is how, after the resurrection, was the body of the Lord a real one, which was able to come in to the

disciples through closed doors. But it is known to us that a divine work, if it is understood by reason: is not wonderful. Neither doth faith have merit : for which human reason provideth a proof. But we ought to ponder these works of our Redeemer, which in themselves can in no way be comprehended, from other of his works: so that the more wondrous may provoke faith in wondrous things. For that body of the Lord went in to the disciples through closed doors: which evidently to the eyes of men at his nativity: came forth from the closed womb of the Virgin. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us.

The Responsories are sung as on Easter Day. 1470.

Lesson ij.

Hat wonder, therefore, that he, after his resurrection, now to be alive for ever, went in through closed doors: who coming that he should die came forth from the unopened womb of a virgin? But because the faith of those beholding that body which was able to be seen appeared uncertain: he straightway shewed them his hands and his side. He allowed his flesh to be touched:

which he had brought in through closed doors. In which he hath shewn two wondrous and, according to human reason, widely contradictory things: that after the resurrection his body proved to be both incorruptible and yet palpable. For it is necessary that what is touched is corruptible: and what is not corruptible cannot be touched. But in a wondrous and indeed incompre-

hensible way our Redeemer, after the resurrection, revealed a body both incorruptible and palpable: that by shewing it to be incorruptible he might incite us to the reward, by offering it as palpable he might dispose us towards faith. He there-

fore shewed himself both incorruptible and palpable: that after his resurrection he might shew his body to be: both of the same nature and of another glory. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us.

Lesson iij.

Hen said he to them again, Peace be unto you. Father hath sent me, even so send I you. That is, as God the Father sent me, God : so I as a man send ye men. The Father sent the Son: who ordained him to be incarnate for the redemption of the human race. He evidently willed him to come into the world for suffering: but yet he loved the Son whom he sent to suffering. Now the Lord sendeth the chosen disciples not to the joys of the world: but as he himself was sent, that they might suffer in the world. Seeing, therefore, that the Son is both loved by the Father, and yet is sent to suffering: so also are the disciples loved by the Lord, which yet are sent

to suffering in the world. Thus rightly it is said, As my Father hath sent me, even so send I you. That is, with the same love do I love you when I send you amid the scandals of persecutors: with which the Father loveth me, whom he caused to come to bear sufferings. However, his being sent may also be understood in accordance with divine nature. For indeed the Son is said to be sent by the same Father: who is begotten of the Father. For he likewise sendeth the Holy Ghost which, while being coequal with the Father and the Son, was yet not incarnated, saying, When the Comforter is come, whom I will send unto you from the Father. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us.

Nevertheless if a Double Feast should fall on this Sunday, namely the Octave of Easter: let it always be deferred until the morrow unless it be the Feast of the Place or the Dedication of the Church. Moreover if anysoever Simple Feast with Rulers of the Choir should fall on the middle Sundays, let it not be deferred but let a service be made of the Feast with a Memorial of the Sunday.


At this Vespers customarily let no Memorial be made of a Feast without Rulers of the Choir that may fall on the morrow.

¶ And it is understood that the aforesaid Memorial of the Resurrection will be said at Matins and at Second Vespers on all the Sundays until the Ascension of the Lord whether the service is of the Sunday or of any Feast with Rulers of the Choir except in the Invention of the Holy Cross.

If to be sure any Double Feast is to be celebrated on the morrow of the Octave of Easter: Second Vespers on Sunday will be of the Feast with a solemn Memorial of the Sunday: and afterwards of the Resurrection.
