Psalm 27. Dominus illuminatio. xxvj.

HE Lord is my light, and my salvation; whom then shall I fear: the Lord is the strength of my life; of whom then shall I be afraid?

2 When the wicked, even mine enemies and my foes, came upon me to eat up my flesh: they stum-bled and fell.

3 Though an host of men were laid against me, yet shall not my heart be afraid: and though there rose up war against me, yet will I put my trust in him.

4 One thing have I desired of the Lord, which I will require : even that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the fair beauty of the Lord, and to vis-it his temple.

salvation.


- 12 When my father and my mo-ther for-sake me : the Lord tak-eth me up.

- 15 I should utter-ly have fainted: but that I believe verily to see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living.
- 16 O tarry thou the Lord's leisure : be strong, and he shall comfort thine heart ; and put thou thy trust in the Lord.

Psalm 28. Ad te Domine. xxvij.


- Nto thee will I cry, O Lord, my strength: think no scorn of me, lest, if thou make as though thou hearest not, I become like them that go down into the pit.

- 5 Recompense them after the work of their hands: pay them that they have deserved.
- 6 For they regard not in their mind the works of the Lord, nor the ope-ration of his hands: therefore shall he break them down, and not build them up.

- 7 Praised be the Lord : for he hath heard the voice of my hum-ble petitions.
- 8 The Lord is my strength, and my shield; my heart hath trusted in him, and $\overset{34}{\text{I}}$ am helped: therefore my heart danceth for joy, and in my song will $\overset{23}{\text{I}}$ praise him.
 - 9 The Lord is my strength : and he is the wholesome defence of his Anointed.
- 10 O save thy people, and give thy blessing unto thine in-he-ritance : feed them, and set them up for ever.

strength.

6 Into thy hands I com-mend my spirit : for thou hast redeemed me, O Lord, thou God of truth.

7 I have hated them that hold of super-stitious va-nities: and my trust hath been in the Lord.

8 I will be glad, and re-joice in thy mercy : for thou hast considered my trouble, and hast known my soul in adversities.

9 Thou hast not shut me up into the hand of the en-emy : but hast set my feet in a large room. 457

10 Have mercy upon me, O Lord, for I am in trouble : and mine eye is consumed for very heaviness ; yea, my soul and my body.

11 For my life is waxen old with hea-viness: and my years with mourning.

12 My strength faileth me, because of mine i-ni-quity: and my bones are 23 consumed.

13 I became a reproach among all mine enemies, but especially a-mong my neighbours : and they of mine acquaintance were afraid of me ; and they that did see me without con-vey-ed themselves from me.

14 I am clean forgotten, as a dead man out of mind : I am become like a bro-ken vessel.

15 For I have heard the blasphemy of the mul-titude : and fear is on every side, while they conspire together against me, and take their counsel to take away my life.

16 But my hope hath been in thee, O Lord : I have said, Thou art my God.

17 My time is in thy hand; deliver me from the hand of mine en-emies: and from them that per-secute me.

18 Shew thy servant the light of thy coun-tenance : and save me for thy mercy's sake.

19 Let me not be confounded, O Lord, for I have cal-led up-on thee: let the ungodly be put to confusion, and be put to si-lence in the grave.

20 Let the lying lips be put to silence : which cruelly, disdainfully, and despitefully, speak a-gainst the righteous.

21 O how plentiful is thy goodness, which thou hast laid up for them that fear thee: and that thou hast prepared for them that put their trust in thee, even be
15678 23 fore the sons of men!

22 Thou shalt hide them privily by thine own presence from the pro-vok-ing of ¹²⁵⁶⁸ all men: thou shalt keep them secretly in thy taberna-cle from the strife of tongues.

23 Thanks be to the Lord : for he hath shewed me marvellous great kindness in a strong city.

24 And when I made haste, I said: I am cast out of the sight of thine eyes.

25 Nevertheless, thou heardest the voice of my prayer : when $\overset{4}{I}$ 15678 23 cri-ed unto thee.

26 O love the Lord, all ye his saints : for the Lord preserveth them that are faithful, and plenteously reward-eth the proud doer.

27 Be strong, and he shall es-tablish your heart: all ye that put your trust in the Lord.

Lessed is he whose unrighteousness is for-given: and whose sin is covered.

2 Blessed is the man unto whom the Lord im-pu-teth no sin : and in whose spi-rit there is no guile.

4 For thy hand is heavy up-on me day and night : and my moisture is like the $^{15678}_{15678}$ $^{23}_{23}$ drought in summer.

 $_5$ I will acknowledge my sin un-to thee : and mine unrighteous-ness have I not hid.

6 I said, I will confess my sins un-to the Lord : and so thou forgavest the wick- 168 23 ed-ness of my sin.

7 For this shall every one that is godly make his prayer unto thee, in a time when thou mayest be found: but in the great water-floods they shall not come nigh him.

8 Thou art a place to hide me in, thou shalt pre-serve me from trouble : thou shalt compass me about with songs of deliverance.

9 I will inform thee, and teach thee in the way wherein thou shalt go: and I will 15678 23 guide thee with mine eye.

10 Be ye not like to horse and mule, which have no under-standing: whose mouths must be held with bit and bridle, lest they fall upon thee.

 - 8 Let all the earth fear the Lord : stand in awe of him, all ye that dwell in the world.
 - 9 For he spake, and it was done : he command-ed, and it stood fast.
- 10 The Lord bringeth the counsel of the heathen to nought : and maketh the devices of the people to be of none effect, and casteth out the coun-sels of princes.
- II The counsel of the Lord shall en-dure for ever : and the thoughts of his heart from generation to generation.
- 12 Blessed are the people whose God is the Lord Je-hovah: and blessed are the folk, that he hath chosen to him to be his inheritance.
 - 13 The Lord looked down from heaven, and beheld all the children of men: from the

habitation of his dwelling, he considereth all them that dwell on the earth.

- 14 He fashioneth all the hearts of them: and un-der-stand-eth all their works.
- 15 There is no king that can be saved by the mul-titude of an host: neither is any mighty man deli-ver-ed by much strength.
- 16 A horse is counted but a vain thing to save a man : neither shall he deliver any man by 23 his great strength.
- 17 Behold, the eye of the Lord is upon them that fear him : and upon them that put their trust in his mercy ; 457 168 23 23
 - 18 To de-liv-er their soul from death : and to feed them in the time of dearth.
 - 19 Our soul hath patiently tar-ried for the Lord : for he is our help and our shield.
 - 20 For our heart shall re-joice in him : because we have ho-ped in his holy Name.
 - 21 Let thy merciful kindness, O Lord, be up-on us : like as we do put our trust in thee.




- 3 O praise the Lord with me : and let us magnify his Name together.

 - 9 O fear the Lord, ye that are his saints: for they that fear him lack nothing.
- 10 The lions do lack, and suffer hunger: but they who seek the Lord shall want no man-ner of thing that is good.
- 11 Come, ye children, and hearken un-to me : I will teach you the fear of the Lord.
 - 12 What man is he that lusteth to live : and would fain see good days?
 - 13 Keep thy tongue from evil : and thy lips, that they speak no guile.
 - 14 Eschew evil, and do good : seek peace, and ensue it.
- 15 The eyes of the Lord are o-ver the righteous : and his ears are o-pen unto their prayers.
- 16 The countenance of the Lord is against them that do evil : to root out the remem-brance of them from the earth.
- 17 The righteous cry, and the Lord hear-eth them : and delivereth them out of all their troubles.
- 18 The Lord is nigh unto them that are of a con-trite heart: and will save such as be of an hum-ble spirit.
- 19 Great are the troubles of the righteous: but the Lord deliv-er-eth him out of all.
 - 20 He keepeth all his bones : so that not one of them is broken.
- 21 But misfortune shall slay the un-godly : and they that hate the right-eous shall be desolate.
 - 22 The Lord delivereth the souls of his servants : and all they that put their trust

in him shall not be destitute.

- 4 Let them be confounded, and put to shame, that seek after my soul : let them be turned back, and brought to confusion, that ima-gine mis-chief for me.
- 5 Let them be as the dust be-fore the wind : and the angel of the Lord scattering them. 258 the Lord scattering them.
- 6 Let their way be dark and slip-pery : and let the angel of the Lord per-secute them.
- 7 For they have privily laid their net to des-troy me with-out a cause : yea, even without a cause have they made a pit for my soul.

- 8 Let a sudden destruction come upon him unawares, and his net that he hath ³⁷ ⁴ ²⁵⁸ ¹⁶ ¹⁶ 1aid pri-vily, catch himself: that he may fall in-to his own mischief.
 - 9 And my soul shall be joyful in the Lord : it shall rejoice in his salvation.
- 10 All my bones shall say, Lord, who is like unto thee, who deliverest the poor from him that is too strong for him : yea, the poor, and him that is in misery, from 15678 23 him that spoileth him ?
 - 11 False witnes-ses did rise up: they laid to my charge things that I knew not.
 - They rewarded me evil for good : to the great dis-com-fort of my soul.
- 13 Nevertheless, when they were sick, I put on sackcloth, and humbled my soul 12568 with fasting: and my prayer shall turn in-to mine own bosom.
- 14 I behaved myself as though it had been my friend, or my brother: I went heavily, as one that mourn-eth for his mother.
- 15 But in mine adversity they rejoiced, and gathered them-selves to-gether: yea, the very abjects came together against me unawares, making mouths at me, and ceased not.
- 16 With the flatterers were busy mockers : who gnashed up-on me with their teeth.
- 17 Lord, how long wilt thou look up-on this : O deliver my soul from the calamities which they bring on me, and my dar-ling from the lions.
- 18 So will I give thee thanks in the great congre-gation: I will praise thee a-mong much people.
- 19 O let not them that are mine enemies triumph over me un-godly: neither let them wink with their eyes that hate me without a cause.
 - 20 And why? their com-mun-ing is not for peace: but they imagine deceitful

words against them that are qui-et in the land.

- 21 They gaped upon me with their mouths, and said : Fie on thee, fie on thee, we saw it with our eyes.
- 22 This thou hast seen, O Lord : hold not thy tongue then, go not far from me, O Lord.
- 23 Awake, and stand up to judge my quarrel : avenge thou my cause, my God, and my Lord.
- 24 Judge me, O Lord my God, according to thy right-eousness : and let them not tri-umph over me.
- 25 Let them not say in their hearts, There, there, so would we have it: neither let them say, We have devoured him.
- 26 Let them be put to confusion and shame together that re-joice at my trouble : let them be clothed with rebuke and dishonour, that boast them-selves against me.
- 27 Let them be glad and rejoice, that favour my righteous dealing: yea, let them say alway, Blessed be the Lord, who hath pleasure in the prosperi-ty of his servant.
- 28 And as for my tongue, it shall be talking of thy right-eousness: and of thy of the day long.

Psalm 36. Dixit injustus. xxxv.

Y heart sheweth me the wickedness of the un-godly : that there is no fear of God before his eyes.

- 2 For he flattereth him-self in his own sight: until his abomina-ble sin be found out.
- 3 The words of his mouth are unrighteous and full of deceit : he hath left off to behave himself wise-ly, and to do good.


- 4 He imagineth mischief upon his bed, and hath set him-self in no good way : neither doth he abhor any thing that is evil.
- 5 Thy mercy, O Lord, reacheth un-to the heavens : and thy faith-ful-ness unto the clouds.
- 6 Thy righteousness standeth like the strong mountains : thy judgements are like the great deep.
- 7 Thou, Lord, shalt save both man and beast; how excellent is thy mercy, O God: and the children of men shall put their trust under the sha-dow of thy wings.
- 8 They shall be satisfied with the plen-teousness of thy house: and thou shalt give them drink of thy pleasures, as out of the river.
 - 9 For with thee is the well of life: and in thy light shall we see light.
- 10 O continue forth thy loving-kindness unto them that know thee : and thy righteousness unto them that are true of heart.
- 11 O let not the foot of pride come a-gainst me : and let not the hand of the unifo678 $^{23}_{\rm god-ly}$ cast me down.
- 12 There are they fallen, all that work wick-edness : they are cast down, and shall not be a-ble to stand.

Ret not thyself because of the un-godly: neither be thou envious against the e-vil doers.

- 2 For they shall soon be cut down like the grass : and be withered ev-en as the green herb.
- 3 Put thou thy trust in the Lord, and be do-ing good : dwell in the land, and ve- 4 15678 23 ri-ly thou shalt be fed.
 - 4 De-light thou in the Lord : and he shall give thee thy heart's desire.
- 5 Commit thy way unto the Lord, and put thy trust in him: and he shall bring it to pass.
- 6 He shall make thy righteousness as clear as the light : and thy just deal-ing as the noon-day. 4
- 7 Hold thee still in the Lord, and abide patient-ly up-on him: but grieve not thyself at him, whose way doth prosper, against the man that doeth af-ter e-vil counsels.
- 8 Leave off from wrath, and let go dis-pleasure : fret not thyself, else shalt thou be mov-ed to do evil.
- 9 Wicked doers shall be root-ed out : and they that patiently abide the Lord, those shall in-he-rit the land.
 - 10 Yet a little while, and the ungodly shall be clean gone : thou shalt look after

his place, and he shall be away.

- 11 But the meek-spirited shall pos-sess the earth : and shall be refreshed in the 15678 23 mul-titude of peace. 4
- 12 The ungodly seeketh coun-sel a-gainst the just : and gnasheth up-on him with his teeth.
 - 13 The Lord shall laugh him to scorn : for he hath seen that his day is coming.
- 14 The ungodly have drawn out the sword, and have bent their bow : to cast down the poor and needy, and to slay such as are of a right con-versation.
 - 15 Their sword shall go through their own heart : and their bow shall be broken.
- 16 A small thing that the right-eous hath: is better than great riches of the ungodly.
- 17 For the arms of the ungodly shall be broken : and the Lord up-hold-eth the righteous.
- 18 The Lord knoweth the days of the godly : and their inheritance shall en-dure for ever. 23
- 19 They shall not be confounded in the peri-lous time : and in the days of dearth they shall have enough. 168
- 20 As for the ungodly, they shall perish, and the enemies of the Lord shall con- 37 4 258 16 sume as the fat of lambs : yea, even as the smoke, shall they consume away.
- 21 The ungodly borroweth, and payeth not again : but the righteous is mer-ci-ful, and liberal.
- 22 Such as are blessed of God shall pos-sess the land : and they that are cursed of 4 15678 23 him, shall be rooted out.
 - 23 The Lord ordereth a good man's going : and maketh his way ac-cep-ta-ble to

himself.

- 24 Though he fall, he shall not be cast away : for the Lord up-hold-eth him with his hand.
- 25 I have been young, and now am old : and yet saw I never the righteous forsaken, nor his seed beg-ging their bread.
 - 26 The righteous is ever merci-ful, and lendeth : and his seed is blessed.
 - 27 Flee from evil, and do the thing that is good : and dwell for evermore.
- 28 For the Lord loveth the thing that is right: he forsaketh not his that be godly, but they are pre-ser-ved for ever.
- 29 The unrighteous shall be pu-nished: as for the seed of the ungodly, it shall be rooted out.
 - 30 The righteous shall in-herit the land : and dwell there-in for ever.
- $_{37}$ The mouth of the righteous is exer-cis-ed in wisdom : and his tongue will be $_{457}$ $_{168}$ $_{23}$ talk-ing of judgement.
 - 32 The law of his God is in his heart: and his go-ings shall not slide.
 - 33 The ungodly se-eth the righteous : and seeketh oc-ca-sion to slay him.
- 34 The Lord will not leave him in his hand : nor condemn him when he is judged.
- 35 Hope thou in the Lord, and keep his way, and he shall promote thee, that thou shalt pos-sess the land : when the ungodly shall pe-rish, thou shalt see it.
- 36 I myself have seen the ungodly in great power : and flourishing like a green bay-tree.
- 37 I went by, and lo, he was gone : I sought him, but his place could no where be found.

38 Keep innocency, and take heed unto the thing that is right : for that shall bring $\overset{4}{a}$ man peace at the last.
