### Psalm 69. Salvum me fac. lxviij.



Ave me, O God : for the waters are come in, e-ven unto my soul.

- 2 I stick fast in the deep mire, where no ground is: I am come into deep waters, so that the floods run over me.
- 3 I am weary of cry-ing; my throat is dry: my sight faileth me for waiting so long upon my God.
- 4 They that hate me without a cause are more than the hairs of my head : they that are mine enemies, and would destroy me guilt-less, are mighty.
- 5 I paid them the things that I nev-er took : God, thou knowest my simpleness, and my faults are not hid from thee.
- 6 Let not them that trust in thee, O Lord God of hosts, be a-sham-ed for my cause: let not those that seek thee be confounded through me, O Lord God of Israel.
  - 7 And why? for thy sake have I suffer-ed reproof: shame hath co-vered my face.
- 8 I am become a stranger un-to my brethren : even an alien unto my mo-ther's children.
- 9 For the zeal of thine house hath even eat-en me : and the rebukes of them that rebuked thee are fal-len upon me.
  - 10 I wept, and chastened my-self with fasting : and that was turn-ed to my reproof.
  - 11 I put on sackcloth also : and they jest-ed upon me.
- 12 They that sit in the gate speak a-gainst me : and the drunkards make songs upon me.
  - 13 But, Lord, I make my prayer un-to thee : in an ac-cep-table time.
  - 14 Hear me, O God, in the multitude of thy mercy: even in the truth of thy

salvation.

15 Take me out of the mire, that I sink not : O let me be delivered from them that hate me, and out of the deep waters.

16 Let not the water-flood drown me, neither let the deep swallow me up: and let not the pit shut her mouth upon me.

17 Hear me, O Lord, for thy loving-kindness is comfort-able : turn thee unto me according to the multi-tude of thy mercies.  $^{347}$   $^{12568}$   $^{23}$ 

18 And hide not thy face from thy servant, for I am in trouble : O haste thee, and hear me.

19 Draw nigh unto my soul, and save it : O deliver me, be-cause of mine enemies.

20 Thou hast known my reproof, my shame, and my dis-honour : mine 4 15678 23 adversaries are all in thy sight.

21 Thy rebuke hath broken my heart ; I am full of hea-viness : I looked for some to have pity on me, but there was no man, neither found I  $^{457}_{a}$   $^{168}_{a}$   $^{23}_{a}$  to comfort me.

22 They gave me gall to eat : and when I was thirsty they gave me vi-negar to drink.

23 Let their table be made a snare to take them-selves withal : and let the things that should have been for their wealth be unto them an oc-ca-sion of falling.

24 Let their eyes be blinded, that they see not : and ev-er bow thou down their backs.

25 Pour out thine indig-na-tion up-on them : and let thy wrathful dis-plea-sure take hold of them.

26 Let their ha-bi-ta-tion be void : and no man to dwell in their tents.

 $^{27}$  For they persecute him whom thou hast smitten : and they talk how they may

vex them whom thou hast wounded.

28 Let them fall from one wickedness to an-other: and not come in-to thy righteousness.

29 Let them be wiped out of the book of the living : and not be written a-mong the righteous.

30 As for me, when I am poor and in hea-viness : thy help, O God, shall lift me up.

31 I will praise the Name of God with a song : and magnify it with thanksgiving.

32 This al-so shall please the Lord : better than a bul-lock that hath horns and hoofs.

37 The humble shall con-si-der this, and be glad : seek ye after God, and your soul shall live.

34 For the Lord hear-eth the poor : and despis-eth not his prisoners.

 $_{35}$  Let heaven and earth praise him : the sea, and all that mov-eth therein.

36 For God will save Sion, and build the ci-ties of Judah : that men may dwell there, and have it in possession.

37 The posterity also of his servants shall in-he-rit it : and they that love his Name shall dwell therein.  $^{4}$ 

Psalm 70. Deus in adjutorium. lxix.

Aste thee, O God, to de-liv-er me : make haste to help me, O Lord.

<sup>2</sup> Let them be ashamed and confounded that seek after my soul : let them be turned backward and put to confusion that wish me evil.


3 Let them for their reward be soon brought to shame : that cry o-ver me, There, there.

4 But let all those that seek thee be joy-ful and glad in thee : and let all such as delight in thy salvation say alway, The Lord be praised.


5 As for me, I am poor and in mi-sery : haste thee un-to me, O God.

- 3 Deliver me, O my God, out of the hand of the un-godly : out of the hand of the un-righ-teous and cruel man.
- 4 For thou, O Lord God, art the thing that I long for : thou art my hope, e-ven from my youth.
- 5 Through thee have I been holden up ev-er since I was born: thou art he that took me out of my mother's womb; my praise shall be al-ways of thee.

- 6 I am become as it were a monster unto many: but my sure trust is in thee.
- 7 O let my mouth be filled with thy praise : that I may sing of thy glory and hon-4 15678 23 our all the day long.
- 8 Cast me not a-way in the time of age: forsake me not when my strength faileth me.
- 9 For mine enemies speak against me, and they that lay wait for my soul take their counsel to-gether, saying : God hath forsaken him ; persecute him, and take him, for there is none to deliver him.
  - 10 Go not far from me, O God: my God, haste thee to help me.
- 11 Let them be confounded and perish that are a-gainst my soul: let them be covered with shame and dishonour that seek to do me evil.
  - 12 As for me, I will patient-ly a-bide alway: and will praise thee more and more.
- 13 My mouth shall daily speak of thy righteousness and sal-vation: for I know no end thereof.
- $^{14}$  I will go forth in the strength of the Lord God : and will make mention of thy  $^{457}$   $^{168}$   $^{23}$  righ-teous-ness only.
- 15 Thou, O God, hast taught me from my youth up un-til now : therefore will I 457 168 23 tell of thy wondrous works.
- 16 Forsake me not, O God, in mine old age, when I am gray-headed: until I have shewed thy strength unto this generation, and thy power to all them that are yet for to come.
- 17 Thy righteousness, O God, is ve-ry high : and great things are they that thou hast done ; O God, who is like unto thee ?
  - 18 O what great troubles and adversities hast thou shewed me! and yet didst thou

- $^{37}$   $^4$   $^{12568}$  turn and re-fresh me : yea, and broughtest me from the deep of the earth again.
  - 19 Thou hast brought me to great honour : and comfort-ed me on every side.
- 20 Therefore will I praise thee and thy faithfulness, O God, playing upon an instru-ment of musick: unto thee will I sing upon the harp, O thou Ho-ly One of Israel.
- $_{\rm 2I}$  My lips will be fain when  $\overset{4}{\rm I}$  sing un-to thee : and so will my soul whom thou  $^{\rm 168}$   $^{\rm 23}$  hast delivered.
- 22 My tongue also shall talk of thy righteousness all the day long : for they are confounded and brought unto shame that seek to do me evil.

### Psalm 72. Deus judicium. lxxj.

Ive the King thy judgements, O God: and thy righteousness un-to the King's son.

- 2 Then shall he judge thy people ac-cording un-to right :  $\frac{4}{}$  and defend the poor.
- 3 The mountains al-so shall bring peace : and the little hills righteousness un-to the people.
- 4 He shall keep the sim-ple folk by their right : defend the children of the poor, and pun-ish the wrong doer.
- 5 They shall fear thee, as long as the sun and moon en-dureth: from one genera-4 15678 23 tion to another.
- 6 He shall come down like the rain in-to a fleece of wool : even as the drops that wa-ter the earth.
- 7 In his time shall the righteous flourish : yea, and abundance of peace, so long as the moon endureth.
  - 8 His dominion shall be also from the one sea to the other : and from the flood


un-to the world's end.

- 9 They that dwell in the wilderness shall kneel be-fore him: his en-e-mies shall lick the dust.
- 10 The kings of Tharsis and of the isles shall give presents : the kings of Arabia 4 15678 23 and Sa-ba shall bring gifts.
  - 11 All kings shall fall down be-fore him : all nations shall do him service.
- 12 For he shall deliver the poor when he crieth : the needy also, and him that  $^{15678}$   $^{23}$  hath no helper.
- 13 He shall be favourable to the sim-ple and needy: and shall pre-serve the souls of the poor.
- 14 He shall deliver their souls from falsehood and wrong : and dear shall their blood be in his sight.
- 15 He shall live, and unto him shall be given of the gold of A-ra-bia: prayer shall be made ever unto him, and daily shall he be praised.
- 16 There shall be an heap of corn in the earth, high up-on the hills: the fruit thereof shall shake like Libanus, and they of the city shall flourish like grass upon the earth.
- 17 His Name shall endure for ever; his Name shall remain under the sun a-mong the pos-te-rities: which shall be blessed through him; and all the hea-then shall praise him.
- 18 Blessed be the Lord God, even the God of Is-rael : which on-ly do-eth won-drous things.
- 19 And blessed be the Name of his majes-ty for ever: and all the earth shall be filled with his majes-ty. A-men, Amen.

Ruly God is loving unto Is-rael: even unto such as are of a clean heart.

2 Nevertheless, my feet were al-most gone: my tread-ings had well-nigh slipt.

- 3 And why ? I was grieved at the wicked : I do also see the ungodly in such prosperity.  $^{23}$ 
  - 4 For they are in no peril of death: but are lus-ty and strong.
- 5 They come in no mis-for-tune like oth-er folk : neither are they pla-gued like other men.
- 6 And this is the cause that they are so holden with pride : and over-whelm-ed with cruelty.
  - 7 Their eyes swell with fatness : and they do e-ven what they lust.
- 8 They corrupt other, and speak of wicked blas-phemy: their talking is a-gainst the most High.
- 9 For they stretch forth their mouth un-to the heaven : and their tongue go-eth through the world.

- 10 Therefore fall the people un-to them : and thereout suck they no small advantage.  $^{4}$  15678 advantage.
- II Tush, say they, how should God per-ceive it: is there know-ledge in the most High?
- 12 Lo, these are the ungodly, these prosper in the world, and these have riches in pos-session : and I said, Then have I cleansed my heart in vain, and washed mine hands in in-nocency.  $^{4 \cdot 15678 \cdot 23}$ 
  - 13 All the day long have I been pun-ished: and chasten-ed eve-ry morning.
- 14 Yea, and I had almost said even as they : but lo, then I should have condemned the genera-tion of thy children.
  - 15 Then thought I to under-stand this: but it was too hard for me,
- 16 Until I went into the sanctu-ary of God : then understood I the end of these men ;
- 17 Namely, how thou dost set them in slip-pery places : and castest them down, 15678 23 and destroyest them.
  - 18 Oh, how sudden-ly do they consume : perish, and come to a fearful end!
- 19 Yea, even like as a dream when one a-waketh : so shalt thou make their image to vanish out of the city.  $^{457}$   $^{168}$   $^{23}$ 
  - 20 Thus my heart was grieved : and it went e-ven through my reins.
  - 21 So foolish was  $\overset{347}{I}$ , and  $\overset{258}{ig}$ -norant : even as it were  $\overset{4}{a}$  beast before thee.
  - 22 Nevertheless, I am alway by thee : for thou hast holden me by my right hand.
  - 23 Thou shalt guide me with thy counsel: and after that re-ceive me with glory.
- 24 Whom have I in heaven but thee : and there is none upon earth that I desire in com-pa-ri-son of thee.

25 My flesh and my heart faileth : but God is the strength of my heart, and my  $^{457\ 168\ 23}$  por-tion for ever.

26 For lo, they that for-sake thee shall perish : thou hast destroyed all them that commit forni-ca-tion against thee.

27 But it is good for me to hold me fast by God, to put my trust in the Lord God: and to speak of all thy works in the gates of the daugh-ter of Sion.

## Psalm 74. Ut quid Deus. lxxiij.

God, wherefore art thou ab-sent from us so long: why is thy wrath so hot against the sheep of thy pasture?

- 2 O think upon thy congre-gation : whom thou hast purchased, and re-deem-ed of old.
- 3 Think upon the tribe of thine in-he-ritance : and mount Si-on, where-in thou hast dwelt.
- 4 Lift up thy feet, that thou mayest utterly destroy every en-emy : which hath done evil in thy sanc-tuary.  $^{4}$   $^{15678}$   $^{23}$
- 5 Thine adversaries roar in the midst of thy congre-gations : and set up their 457 168 23 ban-ners for tokens.
- 6 He that hewed timber afore out of the thick trees : was known to bring it to an ex-cellent work.
  - 7 But now they break down all the carved work thereof: with ax-es and hammers.
- 8 They have set fire upon thy holy places: and have defiled the dwelling-place of thy Name, e-ven unto the ground.
- 9 Yea, they said in their hearts, Let us make havock of them alto-gether: thus have they burnt up all the hous-es of God in the land.


- 10 We see not our tokens, there is not one pro-phet more : no, not one is there among us, that un-der-stand-eth any more.
- 11 O God, how long shall the adversary do this dis-honour : how long shall the enemy blaspheme thy Name, for ever ?
- 12 Why with-drawest thou thy hand : why pluckest thou not thy right hand out of thy bosom to con-sume the enemy ?
- 13 For God is my King of old : the help that is done upon earth he do-eth it himself.
- 14 Thou didst divide the sea through thy power : thou brakest the heads of the  $^{4}$   $^{15678}$   $^{23}$  dra-gons in the waters.
- 15 Thou smotest the heads of Levia-than in pieces : and gavest him to be meat for the peo-ple of the wilderness.
- 16 Thou broughtest out fountains and waters out of the hard rocks : thou driedst  $^{4}$   $^{15678}$   $^{23}$  up migh-ty waters.
- 17 The day is thine, and the night is thine: thou hast prepar-ed the light and the sun.
- 18 Thou hast set all the borders of the earth: thou hast made sum-mer and winter.
- 19 Remember this, O Lord, how the enemy hath re-buked : and how the foolish people hath blas-phem-ed thy Name.
- 20 O deliver not the soul of thy turtle-dove unto the multitude of the en-emies : and forget not the congregation of the poor for ever.  $^{4}$   $^{15678}$   $^{23}$
- 21 Look up-on the co-venant : for all the earth is full of darkness and cru-el habitations.

22 O let not the simple go a-way a-shamed : but let the poor and needy give 15678 23 praise unto thy Name.

23 Arise, O God, main-tain thine own cause : remember how the foolish man blas-phem-eth thee daily.


24 Forget not the voice of thine en-emies : the presumption of them that hate thee increas-eth ev-er more and more.

- 9 For in the hand of the Lord there is a cup, and the wine is red: it is full mixed, and he pour-eth out of the same.
- 10 Ås for the dregs thereof : all the ungodly of the earth shall drink them, and suck them out.
  - 11 But I will talk of the God of Jacob: and praise him for ever.
- 12 All the horns of the ungodly also will I break : and the horns of the righteous 4 15678 23 shall be exalted.

### Psalm 76. Notus in Judea. lxxv.

N Jewry is God known: his Name is great in Israel.

- 2 At Salem is his taber-nacle : and his dwel-ling in Sion.
- There brake he the arrows of the bow : the shield, the sword, and the battle.
- 4 Thou art of more honour and might: than the hills of the robbers.
- 5 The proud are robbed, they have slept their sleep: and all the men whose hands were migh-ty have found nothing.
  - 6 At thy rebuke, O God of Jacob: both the chariot and horse are fallen.
- 7 Thou, even thou art to be feared : and who may stand in thy sight when thou art angry ?
- 8 Thou didst cause thy judgement to be heard from heaven: the earth trem-bled, and was still,
  - 9 When God a-rose to judgement : and to help all the meek upon earth.
- To The fierceness of man shall turn to thy praise : and the fierceness of them shall thou refrain.
  - 11 Promise unto the Lord your God, and keep it, all ye that are round a-bout



will cry un-to God with my voice: even unto God will I cry with my voice,

and he shall hear-ken unto me.

- 2 In the time of my trou-ble I sought the Lord : my sore ran, and ceased not in the night season; my soul re-fus-ed comfort.
- 3 When I am in heaviness, I will think up-on God: when my heart is vex-ed, I will complain.
  - 4 Thou holdest mine eyes waking: I am so fee-ble that I cannot speak.
  - 5 I have consider-ed the days of old : and the years that are past.
- 6 I call to re-mem-brance my song : and in the night I commune with mine own heart, and search out my spirits.
  - 7 Will the Lord absent him-self for ever : and will he be no more intreated ?
  - 8 Is his mercy clean gone for ever: and is his promise come utterly to an end for

evermore?

9 Hath God forgotten to be gracious : and will he shut up his loving-kind-ness in displeasure ?

10 And I said, It is mine own in-fir-mity : but I will remember the years of the right hand of the most Highest.

11 I will remember the works of the Lord : and call to mind thy won-ders of old time.

12 I will think al-so of all thy works : and my talking shall be of thy doings.

13 Thy way, O God, is holy : who is so great a God as our God ?

14 Thou art the God that doeth wonders : and hast declared thy power a-mong the peoples.

15 Thou hast mightily deliver-ed thy people : even the sons of Ja-cob and Joseph.

16 The waters saw thee, O God, the waters saw thee, and were a-fraid : the 457 168 23 depths al-so were troubled.

17 The clouds poured out water, the air thun-dered : and thine ar-rows went abroad.

18 The voice of thy thunder was heard round a-bout : the lightnings shone upon the ground ; the earth was mov-ed, and shook withal.

19 Thy way is in the sea, and thy paths in the great waters : and thy foot-steps are not known.

20 Thou leddest thy people like sheep : by the hand of Mo-ses and Aaron.

### Psalm 78. Attendite popule. lxxvij.

Ear my law, O my people : incline your ears un-to the words of my mouth.

2 I will open my mouth in a pa-rable : I will declare hard sen-tences of old ;

- 3 Which we have heard and known: and such as our fa-thers have told us;
- 4 That we should not hide them from the children of the gene-rations to come: but to shew the honour of the Lord, his mighty and wonder-ful works that he hath done.
- $_5$  He made a covenant with Jacob, and gave Isra-el a law : which he commanded our forefathers to teach their children ;
- 6 That their posteri-ty might know it : and the chil-dren which were yet unborn; 7 To the intent that when they came up : they might show their chil-dren the same;
- 8 That they might put their trust in God : and not to forget the works of God, but to keep his commandments ;
- 9 And not to be as their forefathers, a faithless and stubborn gene-ration : a generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit cleaveth not sted-fast-ly unto God;
- 10 Like as the chil-dren of Eph-raim : who being harnessed, and carrying bows, turned themselves back in the day of battle.
  - 11 They kept not the co-ve-nant of God : and would not walk in his law ;
- 12 But for-gat what he had done : and the wonderful works that he had shew-ed for them.
- 13 Marvellous things did he in the sight of our forefathers, in the land of Egypt :  $^{4}$   $^{15678}$   $^{23}$  even in the field of Zoan.

- 14 He divided the sea, and let them go through : he made the wa-ters to stand on an heap.
- 15 In the day-time also he led them with a cloud : and all the night through with a light of fire.  $^{25}$
- $^{16}$  He clave the hard rocks in the wil-derness : and gave them drink thereof, as it had been out of the great depth.
  - 17 He brought waters out of the sto-ny rock : so that it gushed out like the rivers.
- 18 Yet for all this they sinned more a-gainst him : and provoked the most High-4 15678 23 est in the wilderness.
  - 19 They temp-ted God in their hearts : and re-quir-ed meat for their lust.
- 20 They spake against God also, saying : Shall God prepare a ta-ble in the wilderness?
- 21 He smote the stony rock indeed, that the water gushed out, and the streams  $^{347}$   $^{12568}$  flowed withal : but can he give bread also, or provide flesh for his people ?
- 22 When the Lord heard this, he was wroth : so the fire was kindled in Jacob, and there came up heavy displea-sure a-gainst Israel ;
  - 23 Because they be-lieved not in God : and put not their trust in his help.
  - 24 So he com-mand-ed the clouds above : and opened the doors of heaven.
- 25 He rained down manna also up-on them for to eat : and gave them food from heaven.
  - 26 So man did eat an-gels' food : for he sent them meat enough.
- 27 He caused the east wind to blow under heaven : and through his power he displayed brought in the south-west wind.
  - 28 He rained flesh up-on them as thick as dust : and feathered fowls like as the

sand of the sea.

- 29 He let it fall a-mong their tents: even round about their ha-bitation.
- 30 So they did eat, and were well filled; for he gave them their own desire: they were not dis-ap-point-ed of their lust.
- 31 But while the meat was yet in their mouths, the heavy wrath of God came upon them, and slew the weal-thiest of them: yea, and smote down the chosen men that were in Israel.
  - 32 But for all this they sinned yet more : and believ-ed not his wondrous works.
  - 33 Therefore their days did he con-sume in va-nity : and their years in trouble.
- 34 When he slew them, they sought him: and turned them early, and en-quir-ed after God.
- 35 And they remembered that God was their strength: and that the high God was their redeemer.
- 36 Nevertheless, they did but flat-ter him with their mouth : and dissem-bled with him in their tongue.  $^{4}$
- $^{37}$  4  $^{258}$   $^{16}$  16  $^{37}$  For their heart was not whole with him : neither continued they sted-fast in his covenant.
- 38 But he was so merciful, that he for-gave their misdeeds : and des-troy-ed them not.
- 39 Yea, many a time turned he his wrath a-way : and would not suffer his whole  $^{4}$   $^{15678}$   $^{23}$  dis-plea-sure to arise.
- 40 For he considered that they were but flesh : and that they were even a wind that passeth away, and com-eth not again.
  - 41 Many a time did they provoke him in the wild-erness : and grieved him in the

desert.

- 42 They turned back, and temp-ted God: and moved the Ho-ly One in Israel.
- 43 They thought not of his hand : and of the day when he delivered them from the hand of the enemy.
- 44 How he had wrought his mira-cles in Egypt : and his wonders in the field of Zoan.
  - 45 He turned their waters in-to blood : so that they might not drink of the rivers.
  - 46 He sent lice among them, and de-voured them up : and frogs to destroy them.
- 47 He gave their fruit unto the cater-pillar : and their labour un-to the grasshopper.
- 48 He destroyed their vines with hail-stones: and their mul-ber-ry-trees with the frost.
- 49 He smote their cattle al-so with hail-stones : and their flocks with hot thunderbolts.
- 50 He cast upon them the furiousness of his wrath, anger, dis-plea-sure, and 12568 trouble : and sent evil an-gels among them.
- 51 He made a way to his indignation, and spared not their soul from death : but gave their life o-ver to the pestilence ;
- 52 And smote all the first-born in Egypt : the most principal and mightiest in the dwellings of Ham.
- 53 But as for his own people, he led them forth like sheep : and carried them in 457 168 23 the wil-der-ness like a flock.
- 54 He brought them out safely, that they should not fear : and overwhelmed their  $^{457\ 168\ 23}$  en-e-mies with the sea.

55 And brought them within the borders of his sanctu-ary : even to his mountain which he purchas-ed with his right hand.

56 He cast out the heathen al-so be-fore them : caused their land to be divided among them for an heritage, and made the tribes of Isra-el to dwell in their tents.

57 So they tempted and dis-pleased the most high God : and kept not his tes-timonies;

58 But turned their backs, and fell away like their fore-fathers : starting a-side like a broken bow.

59 For they grieved him with their hill-altars : and provoked him to displea-sure with their images.

60 When God heard this, he was wroth: and took sore dis-plea-sure at Israel.

61 So that he forsook the taber-na-cle in Silo : even the tent that he had pitch-ed among men.

62 He delivered their power in-to cap-ti-vity: and their beauty into the en-emy's hand.

 $^{37}$  4  $^{258}$   $^{16}$  63 He gave his people over al-so un-to the sword : and was wroth with his inheritance.

12568 64 The fire con-sum-ed their young men : and their maidens were not giv-en to marriage.

65 Their priests were slain with the sword : and there were no widows to make 15678 23 la-mentation.

66 So the Lord awaked as one out of sleep: and like a giant re-fresh-ed with wine.

67 He smote his enemies in the hin-der parts : and put them to a per-pe-tual

shame.

68 He refused the taber-na-cle of Joseph : and chose not the tribe of Ephraim ;

69 But chose the tribe of Judah: even the hill of Si-on which he loved.

70 And there he built his temple on high : and laid the foundation of it like the ground which he hath made con-ti-nually.

 $^{37}$  He chose David al-so his servant : and took him a-way from the sheep-folds.

72 As he was following the ewes great with young ones he took him: that he might feed Jacob his people, and Isra-el his inheritance.

73 So he fed them with a faith-ful and true heart : and ruled them prudently with  $^{15678}$   $^{23}$  all his power.





  - 10 Wherefore do the hea-then say :  $\stackrel{4}{-}$  Where is now their God ?
- 11 O let the vengeance of thy ser-vants' blood that is shed: be openly shewed upon the hea-then in our sight.
- 12 O let the sorrowful sighing of the prisoners come be-fore thee: according to the greatness of thy power, preserve thou those that are ap-point-ed to die.
- 13 And for the blasphemy wherewith our neighbours have blas-phem-ed thee: reward thou them, O Lord, seven-fold in-to their bosom.
- 14 So we, that are thy people, and sheep of thy pasture, shall give thee thanks for ever : and will alway be showing forth thy praise from generation to generation.

- Ear, O thou Shepherd of Israel, thou that leadest Joseph like a sheep: shew thyself also, thou that sittest up-on the Cherubims.
  - 2 Before Ephraim, Benjamin, and Ma-nasses: stir up thy strength, and come, and

- 13 The wild boar out of the wood doth root it up: and the wild beasts of the field devour it.
- 14 Turn thee again, thou God of hosts, look down from heaven : behold, and visit this vine ;
  - 15 And the place of the vineyard that thy right hand hath planted : and the

branch that thou madest so strong for thyself.


16 It is burnt with fire, and cut down: and they shall perish at the re-buke of thy countenance.





15 Comfort us again now, after the time that thou hast pla-gued us : and for the years wherein we have suf-fer-ed adversity.


