18 And hide not thy face from thy servant, for I am in trouble : O haste thee, and

20 Thou hast known my reproof, my shame, and my dis-honour : mine

25 Pour out thine indig-na-tion up-on them : and let thy wrathful dis-plea-sure  
take hold of them.

26 Let their ha-bi-ta-tion be void : and no man to dwell in their tents.

27 For they persecute him whom thou hast smitten : and they talk how they may

vex them whom thou hast wounded.

28 Let them fall from one wickedness to another : and not come in-to thy righteousness.

29 Let them be wiped out of the book of the living : and not be written among the righteous.

30 As for me, when I am poor and in heaviness : thy help, O God, shall lift me up.

31 I will praise the Name of God with a song : and magnify it with thanksgiving.

32 This also shall please the Lord : better than a bullock that hath horns and hoofs.

33 The humble shall consider this, and be glad : seek ye after God, and your soul shall live.

34 For the Lord hear-eth the poor : and despis-eth not his prisoners.

35 Let heaven and earth praise him : the sea, and all that mov-eth therein.

36 For God will save Sion, and build the cities of Judah : that men may dwell there, and have it in possession.

37 The posterity also of his servants shall inherit it : and they that love his Name shall dwell therein.



3 Deliver me, O my God, out of the hand of the un-godly : out of the hand of the un-righ-teous and cruel man.

4 For thou, O Lord God, art the thing that I long for : thou art my hope, e-ven from my youth.

5 Through thee have I been holden up ev-er since I was born : thou art he that took me out of my mother's womb ; my praise shall be al-ways of thee.

6 I am become as it were a monster unto many : but my sure trust is in thee.

7 O let my mouth be filled with thy praise : that I may sing of thy glory and honour all the day long.

8 Cast me not a-way in the time of age : forsake me not when my strength faileth me.

9 For mine enemies speak against me, and they that lay wait for my soul take their counsel together, saying : God hath forsaken him ; persecute him, and take him, for there is none to deliver him.

10 Go not far from me, O God : my God, haste thee to help me.

11 Let them be confounded and perish that are against my soul : let them be covered with shame and dishonour that seek to do me evil.

12 As for me, I will patiently abide alway : and will praise thee more and more.

13 My mouth shall daily speak of thy righteousness and salvation : for I know no end thereof.

14 I will go forth in the strength of the Lord God : and will make mention of thy righteousness only.

15 Thou, O God, hast taught me from my youth up until now : therefore will I tell of thy wondrous works.

16 Forsake me not, O God, in mine old age, when I am gray-headed : until I have shewed thy strength unto this generation, and thy power to all them that are yet for to come.

17 Thy righteousness, O God, is very high : and great things are they that thou hast done ; O God, who is like unto thee ?

18 O what great troubles and adversities hast thou shewed me ! and yet didst thou

20 Therefore will I praise thee and thy faithfulness, O God, playing upon an  
instru-<sup>347</sup> <sup>12568</sup>ment of musick : unto thee will I sing upon the harp, O thou Ho-ly <sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup> One of  
Israel.

21 My lips will be fain when I sing un-to thee : and so will my soul whom thou <sup>457</sup>  
<sup>168</sup> <sup>23</sup> hast delivered.

22 My tongue also shall talk of thy righteousness <sup>347</sup> <sup>12568</sup> all the day long : for they are  
confounded and brought unto shame that seek to <sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup> do me evil.

**G**ive the King thy <sup>347</sup> <sup>12568</sup> judgements, O God : and thy righteousness <sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup> un-to the  
King's son.

2 Then shall he judge thy people ac-<sup>347</sup> <sup>258</sup> <sup>16</sup> cording un-to right : — and defend the poor. <sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup>

3 The mountains <sup>37</sup> <sup>4</sup> shall bring peace : and the little hills righteousness <sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup>  
<sup>23</sup> un-to the people.

4 He shall keep the sim-<sup>37</sup> <sup>4</sup> <sup>258</sup> <sup>16</sup> ple folk by their right : defend the children of the poor,  
and pun-<sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup> ish the wrong doer.

5 They shall fear thee, as long as the sun and moon en-<sup>347</sup> <sup>12568</sup> dureth : from one genera-  
<sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup> tion to another.

6 He shall come down like the rain in-<sup>37</sup> <sup>4</sup> <sup>258</sup> <sup>16</sup> to a fleece of wool : even as the drops that <sup>4</sup>  
<sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup> wa-ter the earth.

7 In his time shall the righteous flourish : yea, and abundance of peace, so long as  
<sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup> the moon endureth.

8 His dominion shall be also from the one sea to the other <sup>347</sup> <sup>12568</sup> : and from the flood

<sup>4 15678 23</sup>  
un-to the world's end.

9 They that dwell in the wilderness shall <sup>347 12568</sup> kneel be-fore him : his <sup>4 15678 23</sup> en-e-mies shall lick the dust.

10 The kings of Tharsis and of the isles shall <sup>347 12568</sup> give presents : the kings of Arabia <sup>4 15678 23</sup> and Sa-ba shall bring gifts.

11 All kings shall <sup>37 4 12568</sup> fall down be-fore him : all nations shall <sup>4 15678 23</sup> do him service.

12 For he shall deliver the <sup>37 4 12568</sup> poor when he crieth : the needy also, and him <sup>4</sup> that <sup>15678 23</sup> hath no helper.

13 He shall be favourable to the <sup>37 4 12568</sup> sim-ple and needy : and shall <sup>4 168 2357</sup> pre-serve the souls of the poor.

14 He shall deliver their souls from <sup>347 12568</sup> falsehood and wrong : and dear shall their <sup>4</sup> blood be in his sight. <sup>15678 23</sup>

15 He shall live, and unto him shall be given of the <sup>37 4 258 16</sup> gold of A-ra-bia : prayer shall be made ever unto him, and daily shall he <sup>4 15678 23</sup> be praised.


16 There shall be an heap of corn in the earth, <sup>347 258 16</sup> high up-on the hills : the fruit thereof shall shake like Libanus, and they of the city shall flourish like <sup>4 15678 23</sup> grass upon the earth.



2 Nevertheless, my feet were <sup>347 258 16</sup> al-most gone : my tread-ings had well-nigh <sup>457 168 23</sup> slipt.

3 And why ? I was grieved <sup>347 12568</sup> at the wicked : I do also see the ungodly <sup>4 15678</sup> in such <sup>23</sup> prosperity.

4 For they are in no peril <sup>347 12568</sup> of death : but are lus-ty and strong. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>

5 They come in no mis-for-tune <sup>37 4 258 16</sup> like oth-er folk : neither are they <sup>457 168 23</sup> pla-gued like other men.

6 And this is the cause that they are so <sup>347 12568</sup> holden with pride : and over-whelm-ed <sup>457 168</sup> with <sup>23</sup> cruelty.

7 Their eyes swell with fatness : and they do e-ven what they lust. <sup>347 12568 4 15678 23</sup>

8 They corrupt other, and speak of wicked <sup>347 258 16</sup> blas-phemy : their talking is a-<sup>4 15678</sup>gainst <sup>23</sup> the most High.

9 For they stretch forth their mouth <sup>347 12568</sup> un-to the heaven : and their tongue <sup>4 15678 23</sup> go-eth through the world.

10 Therefore fall the <sup>347</sup> people <sup>258</sup> un-to <sup>16</sup> them : and thereout suck they <sup>4</sup> no <sup>15678</sup> small  
<sup>23</sup> advantage.

11 Tush, say they, how should <sup>347</sup> God <sup>12568</sup> per-ceive it : is there know-ledge in the most  
High ?

12 Lo, these are the ungodly, these prosper in the world, and these have riches <sup>347</sup> in  
<sup>12568</sup> pos-session : and I said, Then have I cleansed my heart in vain, and washed mine  
<sup>4</sup> hands in <sup>15678</sup> in-nocency.

13 All the day long have I been <sup>347</sup> pun-ished <sup>258</sup> : and <sup>16</sup> chasten-ed <sup>4</sup> eve-ry <sup>15678</sup> morning.

14 Yea, and I had almost said <sup>347</sup> even as they <sup>12568</sup> : but lo, then I should have condemned  
<sup>4</sup> the genera-tion of thy children.

15 Then thought I to under-stand <sup>347</sup> this : <sup>12568</sup> but it was too hard for me,

16 Until I went into the sanctu-ary <sup>347</sup> of God <sup>12568</sup> : then understood I the end of these  
<sup>4</sup> men ;

17 Namely, how thou dost set them in <sup>37</sup> slip-<sup>4</sup>pery <sup>12568</sup> places : and castest them down,  
<sup>15678</sup> and <sup>23</sup> destroyest them.

18 Oh, how sudden-ly <sup>347</sup> do they <sup>258</sup> consume : <sup>16</sup> perish, and come to <sup>457</sup> a <sup>168</sup> fearful <sup>23</sup> end !

19 Yea, even like as a dream when one <sup>347</sup> a-waketh <sup>12568</sup> : so shalt thou make their image  
<sup>457</sup> to vanish out of the city.

20 Thus my heart was <sup>347</sup> grieved <sup>12568</sup> : and it went <sup>4</sup> e-ven <sup>15678</sup> through my reins.

21 So foolish was I, and <sup>347</sup> ig-norant <sup>258</sup> : even as it were <sup>16</sup> a <sup>4</sup> beast <sup>15678</sup> before thee.

22 Nevertheless, I am <sup>347</sup> alway <sup>12568</sup> by thee : for thou hast holden me by my right hand.

23 Thou shalt guide me with thy counsel : and after that <sup>457</sup> re-ceive <sup>168</sup> me with <sup>23</sup> glory.

24 Whom have I in <sup>347</sup> heaven <sup>12568</sup> but thee : and there is none upon earth that I desire  
<sup>457</sup> in com-pa-ri-son of thee.

25 My flesh <sup>37 4</sup> and my heart <sup>12568</sup> faileth : but God is the strength of my heart, and my <sup>457 168 23</sup> por-tion for ever.

26 For lo, they that for-sake thee shall perish : thou hast destroyed all them that <sup>37 4</sup> commit forni-ca-tion <sup>12568</sup> against thee. <sup>457 168 23</sup>

27 But it is good for me to hold me fast by God, to put my trust in the Lord <sup>37 4</sup> God : and to speak of all thy works in the gates of the daugh-ter of Sion. <sup>12568</sup> <sup>457 168 23</sup>

*Psalm 74. Ut quid Deus. lxxiiij.*

 God, wherefore art thou ab-sent from us so long : why is thy wrath so hot <sup>37 4</sup> against the sheep of thy pasture ? <sup>258 16</sup> <sup>457 168 23</sup>

2 O think upon thy congre-gation : whom thou hast purchased, and re-deem-ed <sup>347 12658</sup> of old. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>

3 Think upon the tribe of thine in-he-ritance : and mount Si-on, where-in thou <sup>347 258 16</sup> hast dwelt. <sup>4 168 2357</sup>

4 Lift up thy feet, that thou mayest utterly destroy every en-emy : which hath <sup>347 258 16</sup> done evil in thy sanc-tuary. <sup>4 15678 23</sup>

5 Thine adversaries roar in the midst of thy congre-gations : and set up their <sup>347 12568</sup> ban-ners for tokens. <sup>457 168 23</sup>

6 He that hewed timber afore out of the thick trees : was known to bring it to an <sup>37 4</sup> ex-cel-lent work. <sup>12568</sup> <sup>15678 23</sup>

7 But now they break down all the <sup>347 258 16</sup> carved work thereof : with ax-es and hammers. <sup>457 168 23</sup>

8 They have set fire upon thy holy places : and have defiled the dwelling-place of <sup>347 2568</sup> thy Name, e-ven unto the ground. <sup>457 168 23</sup>

9 Yea, they said in their hearts, Let us make havock of them <sup>347 12568</sup> alto-gether : thus <sup>4 168 2357</sup> have they burnt up all the hous-es of God in the land.

10 We see not our tokens, there is not one <sup>347</sup> pro-phet <sup>258</sup> more : no, not one is there  
among us, that <sup>4</sup> un-der-stand-eth <sup>15678</sup> any <sup>23</sup> more.

11 O God, how long shall the adversary <sup>37</sup> do <sup>4</sup> this <sup>12568</sup> dis-honour : how long shall the  
enemy <sup>4</sup> blaspheme <sup>15678</sup> thy <sup>23</sup> Name, for ever ?

12 Why with-drawest thou thy hand : why pluckest thou not thy right hand out  
of thy bosom to <sup>4</sup> con-sume <sup>15678</sup> the <sup>23</sup> enemy ?

13 For God is my King <sup>37</sup> of <sup>4</sup> old : the help that is done upon earth he <sup>258</sup> do-eth <sup>16</sup> it  
himself. <sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup>

14 Thou didst divide the sea through thy <sup>347</sup> power : thou brakest the heads of the  
dra-gons in the waters. <sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup>

15 Thou smotest the heads of Levia-than in pieces : and gavest him to be meat  
for the peo-ple <sup>4</sup> of the wilderness. <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup>

16 Thou broughtest out fountains and waters out of the <sup>37</sup> hard <sup>4</sup> rocks : thou driedst  
up <sup>4</sup> migh-ty <sup>15678</sup> waters. <sup>23</sup>

17 The day is thine, and the night is thine : thou hast prepar-ed <sup>4</sup> the <sup>168</sup> light <sup>2357</sup> and the  
sun.

18 Thou hast set all the borders <sup>347</sup> of the earth : thou hast made <sup>258</sup> sum-mer <sup>16</sup> and  
winter. <sup>457</sup> <sup>168</sup> <sup>23</sup>

19 Remember this, O Lord, how the enemy <sup>347</sup> hath <sup>12658</sup> re-buked : and how the foolish  
people <sup>4</sup> hath <sup>15678</sup> blas-phem-ed <sup>23</sup> thy Name.

20 O deliver not the soul of thy turtle-dove unto the multitude <sup>347</sup> of the en-emies :  
and forget not the congregation <sup>4</sup> of the poor <sup>15678</sup> for ever. <sup>23</sup>

21 Look up-on <sup>347</sup> the <sup>258</sup> co-venant : for all the earth is full of darkness and cru-el <sup>16</sup> ha-  
bitations. <sup>4</sup> <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup>

22 O let not the simple go a-way a-shamed : but let the poor and needy give<sup>4</sup>  
praise<sup>15678</sup> unto thy Name.<sup>23</sup>

23 Arise, O God, main-tain<sup>347</sup> thine own cause : remember how the foolish man<sup>12568</sup>  
blas-phem-eth<sup>457</sup> thee daily.<sup>168 23</sup>

24 Forget not the voice of thine en-emies : the presumption of them that hate<sup>37 4</sup>  
thee increas-eth<sup>258 16</sup> ev-er more and more.<sup>4 15678 23</sup>

3 When I receive the cong-re-gation : I shall judge ac-cord-ing unto right.<sup>347 12568 4 15678 23</sup>  
4 The earth is weak, and all the in-habi-ters thereof : I bear up the pil-lars of it.<sup>347 258 16 4 15678 23</sup>  
5 I said unto the fools, Deal not so madly : and to the ungod-ly, Set not up your  
horn.

6 Set not up your horn on high : and speak not with a stiff neck.<sup>347 258 16 4 15678 23</sup>

7 For promotion cometh neither from the east, nor from the west : — nor yet<sup>347 258 16 4 168 2357</sup>  
from the south.

8 And why ? God is the Judge : he putteth down one, and set-teth up another.

9 For in the hand of the Lord there is a cup, and the wine is red : it is full mixed,  
and he pour-eth out of the same.

10 As for the dregs thereof : all the ungodly of the earth shall drink them, and  
suck them out.

11 But I will talk of the God of Jacob : and praise him for ever.

12 All the horns of the ungodly also will I break : and the horns of the righteous  
shall be exalted.

shalt thou refrain.



15 Thou hast mightily deliver-ed thy people : even the sons of Ja-cob and Joseph.

generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit cleaveth not <sup>457</sup> sted-<sup>168</sup> fast-<sup>23</sup> ly  
unto God ;

10 Like as the <sup>37</sup> chil-<sup>4</sup> dren of <sup>258</sup> Eph-<sup>16</sup> raim : who being harnessed, and carrying bows,

12 But for-<sup>347</sup> gat what he had <sup>258</sup> done : and the wonderful works that he had <sup>4</sup> shew-<sup>15678</sup> ed <sup>23</sup>

13 Marvellous things did he in the sight of our forefathers, in the <sup>347</sup> land of <sup>12568</sup> Egypt :  
even in the field of <sup>4</sup> Zoan. <sup>15678</sup> <sup>23</sup>

14 He divided the sea, and let them go through : he made the wa-ters to stand on an heap.

15 In the day-time also he led them with a cloud : and all the night through with a light of fire.

16 He clave the hard rocks in the wil-derness : and gave them drink thereof, as it had been out of the great depth.

17 He brought waters out of the sto-ny rock : so that it gushed out like the rivers.

18 Yet for all this they sinned more a-against him : and provoked the most High-est in the wilderness.

19 They temp-ted God in their hearts : and re-quir-ed meat for their lust.

20 They spake against God also, saying : Shall God prepare a ta-ble in the wilderness ?

21 He smote the stony rock indeed, that the water gushed out, and the streams flowed withal : but can he give bread also, or provide flesh for his people ?

22 When the Lord heard this, he was wroth : so the fire was kindled in Jacob, and there came up heavy displea-sure a-against Israel ;

23 Because they be-lieved not in God : and put not their trust in his help.

24 So he com-mand-ed the clouds above : and opened the doors of heaven.

25 He rained down manna also up-on them for to eat : and gave them food from heaven.

26 So man did eat an-gels' food : for he sent them meat enough.

27 He caused the east wind to blow under heaven : and through his power he brought in the south-west wind.

28 He rained flesh up-on them as thick as dust : and feathered fowls like as the

sand of the sea.

29 He let it fall a-mong their tents : even round about their ha-bitation.

30 So they did eat, and were well filled ; for he gave them their own desire : they were not dis-ap-point-ed of their lust.

31 But while the meat was yet in their mouths, the heavy wrath of God came upon them, and slew the weal-thiest of them : yea, and smote down the chosen men that were in Israel.

32 But for all this they sinned yet more : and believ-ed not his wondrous works.

33 Therefore their days did he con-sume in va-nity : and their years in trouble.

34 When he slew them, they sought him : and turned them early, and en-quir-ed after God.

35 And they remembered that God was their strength : and that the high God was their redeemer.

36 Nevertheless, they did but flat-ter him with their mouth : and dissem-bled with him in their tongue.

37 For their heart was not whole with him : neither continued they sted-fast in his covenant.

38 But he was so merciful, that he for-gave their misdeeds : and des-troy-ed them not.

39 Yea, many a time turned he his wrath a-way : and would not suffer his whole dis-plea-sure to arise.

40 For he considered that they were but flesh : and that they were even a wind that passeth away, and com-eth not again.

41 Many a time did they provoke him in the wild-erness : and grieved him in the

desert.

42 They turned back, and temp-ted God : and moved the Ho-ly One in Israel.

43 They thought not of his hand : and of the day when he delivered them from the hand of the enemy.

44 How he had wrought his mira-cles in Egypt : and his wonders in the field of Zoan.

45 He turned their waters in-to blood : so that they might not drink of the rivers.

46 He sent lice among them, and de-voured them up : and frogs to destroy them.

47 He gave their fruit unto the cater-pillar : and their labour un-to the grasshopper.

48 He destroyed their vines with hail-stones : and their mul-ber-ry-trees with the frost.

49 He smote their cattle al-so with hail-stones : and their flocks with hot thunderbolts.

50 He cast upon them the furiousness of his wrath, anger, dis-plea-sure, and trouble : and sent evil an-gels among them.

51 He made a way to his indignation, and spared not their soul from death : but gave their life o-ver to the pestilence ;

52 And smote all the first-born in Egypt : the most principal and mightiest in the dwell-ings of Ham.

53 But as for his own people, he led them forth like sheep : and carried them in the wil-der-ness like a flock.

54 He brought them out safely, that they should not fear : and overwhelmed their en-e-mies with the sea.

55 And brought them within the borders of his sanctu-ary : even to his mountain  
which he purchas-ed with his right hand.

56 He cast out the heathen al-so be-fore them : caused their land to be divided  
among them for an heritage, and made the tribes of Isra-el to dwell in their tents.

57 So they tempted and dis-pleas-ed the most high God : and kept not his tes-ti-  
monies ;

58 But turned their backs, and fell away like their fore-fathers : starting a-side like  
a broken bow.

59 For they grieved him with their hill-altars : and provoked him to displea-sure  
with their images.

60 When God heard this, he was wroth : and took sore dis-plea-sure at Israel.

61 So that he forsook the taber-na-cle in Silo : even the tent that he had pitch-ed  
among men.

62 He delivered their power in-to cap-ti-vity : and their beauty into the en-emy's  
hand.

63 He gave his people over al-so un-to the sword : and was wroth with his in-  
heritance.

64 The fire con-sum-ed their young men : and their maidens were not giv-en to  
marriage.

65 Their priests were slain with the sword : and there were no widows to make  
la-mentation.

66 So the Lord awaked as one out of sleep : and like a giant re-fresh-ed with  
wine.

67 He smote his enemies in the hin-der parts : and put them to a per-pe-tual

shame.

68 He refused the tabe<sup>37</sup>-na<sup>4</sup>-cle of Joseph : and chose not the tribe of Ephraim ;

69 But chose the tribe of Judah : even the hill of Si-on which he loved.

70 And there he built his temple on high : and laid the foundation of it like the ground which he hath made con-ti-nually.

71 He chose David al-so his servant : and took him a-way from the sheep-folds.


72 As he was following the ewes great with young ones he took him : that he might feed Jacob his people, and Isra-el his inheritance.
