
- 2. The Lord is great in Sion : and high above all people.





- 6. I am become like a pelican in the wilderness: and like an owl that is in the désert.
- 7. I have watched, and am even as it were a sparrow: that sitteth alone

ũpôn the housetop.

- 8. Mine enemies revile me âll the day long: and they that are mad upon me are sworn togêther against me.
- 9. For I have eaten âshes as it were bread: and mingled my drink with weeping.

- 19. For he hath looked down from his sanctuary: out of the heaven did the Lord behold the earth;
- 20. That he might hear the mournings of such as are in captivity: and deliver them that are appointed unto death;
- 21. That they may declare the Name of the Lord in Sion : and his worship at Jerusalem;

- 22. When the people are gatherêd togéther : and the kingdoms âlso, to sérve the Lord.
- 23. He brought down my strêngth in my journey : and shôrtenéd my days.
- 24. But I said, O my God, take me not away in the midst of mine age: as for thy years, they endure throughout all generations.
- 25. Thou, Lord, in the beginning hast laid the foundation of the earth: and the heavens are the work of thy hands.
- 26. They shall perish, bũt thoù shált endure : they all shall wax old ãs dôth a gárment ;
- 27. And as a vesture shalt thou change them, and they sh a ll be changed: but thou art the same, and thy years shall not fail.
- 28. The children of thy servants shall continue : and their seed shall stand fast in thy sight.

Psalm 103. Benedic anima mea. cij.


- Raise the Lôrd, Ó my soul : and all that is within me prâise his hóly Name.

- 6. The Lord executeth righteousness and judgement: for all them that are oppressed with wrong.

- 7. He shewed his ways unto Moses : his works unto the children of Israel.
- 8. The Lord is full of compassion and mércy: long-suffering, and of great goodness.
- 9. He will not âlway be chiding : neither keepeth he his ânger for éver.
- 10. He hath not dealt with us after our sins: nor rewarded us according to our wickednesses.
- II. For look how high the heaven is in comparison of the earth: so great is his mercy also toward them that fear him.
- 12. Look how wide also the east is from the west: so far hath he set our sins from us.
- 13. Yea, like as a father pitieth his own children: even so is the Lord merciful unto them that fear him.
- 14. For he knoweth whereof we are made : he remembereth that we are but dust.
- 15. The days of man are but as grass: for he flourisheth as a flower of the field.

- 16. For as soon as the wind goeth ôver it, it is gone : and the place thereof shall know it no more.
- 17. But the merciful goodness of the Lord endureth for ever and ever upon thêm that fear him: and his right-eousness upon chîldren's children;
- 18. Even upon such as k ee p his covenant : and think upon his commandments to do them.
- 19. The Lord hath prepared his seat in heaven : and his kingdom rûleth over all.
- 20. O praise the Lord, ye angels of his, yê thất excél in strength: ye that fulfil his commandment, and hearken unto the voice of his words.
- 21. O praise the Lôrd, all yé his hosts : ye servants of his that dô his pleasure.

- Raise the Lôrd, † Ó my soul : O Lord my God, thou art become exceeding glorious ; thou art clothed with majestŷ and hónour.
- 2. Thou deckest thyself with light as it were wîth a garment: and spreadest out the heavens lîke a cúrtain.
- 3. Who layeth the beams of his chambers in the waters : and maketh the clouds his chariot, and walketh upon the wings of the wind.
- 4. He maketh his angels spirits : and his ministers a flaming fire.
- 5. He laid the foundations of the earth: that it never should move at any time.
- 6. Thou coveredst it with the deep, like as with a garment: the waters stand in the hills.
- 7. Ât thỹ rebûke they flee: at the voice of thy thữnder they áre afraid.
- 8. They go up as high as the hills, and down to the valleys be neath: even unto the place which thou hast appointed for them.
- 9. Thou hast set them their bounds which they shall not pass: neither

- turn again to côver thé earth.
- 10. He sendeth the springs intô the rivers : which rûn amóng the hills.
- II. All beasts of the field drink thereof: and the wild asses quench their thirst.
- 12. Beside them shall the fowls of the air have their habitation: and sing among the branches.
- 13. He watereth the hills from above : the earth is filled with the fruit of thy works.
- 14. He bringeth forth grâss for the cáttle : and green herb for the sêrvice of men ;
- 15. That he may bring food out of the earth, and wine that maketh glad the heart of man: and oil to make him a cheerful countenance, and bread to strengthen man's heart.
- 16. The trees of the Lord âlso are full of sap: even the cedars of Libanus which hê hath plánted;
- 17. Wherein the birds make their nests: and the fir-trees are a dwelling for the stork.
- 18. The high hills are a refuge for the wild goats : and so are the stony

rôcks for the cónies.

- 19. He appointed the moon for cêrtain seasons: and the sun knoweth his going down.
- 20. Thou makest darkness thất it máy be night : wherein all the beasts of thế fôrest dó move.
- 21. The lions, roaring after their prey: do seek their meat from God.
- 22. The sun ariseth, and they get them away togéther : and lay them dôwn in their dens.
- 23. Man goeth forth to his work, and to his lábour : ũnt il the évening.
- 24. O Lord, how mânifold are thy works: in wisdom hast thou made them all; the earth is fûll of thy riches.
- 25. So is the great and wide sea also: wherein are things creeping innumerable, bõth smâll and great beasts.
- 26. There go the ships, and there is thất Levíathan: whom thou hast made to take his pâstime thérein.
- 27. These wait all upon thee : that thou mayest give them meat in due

season.

- 28. When thou givest it them they gather it: and when thou openest thy hand they are filled with good.
- 29. When thou hidest thy face they are troubled: when thou takest away their breath they die, and are turned again to their dust.
- 30. When thou lettest thy breath go forth they shall be made : and thou shalt renew the face of the earth.
- 31. The glorious Majesty of the Lord shall endûre for éver : the Lord shall rejôice ín his works.
- 32. The earth shall tremble at the look of him: if he do but touch the hills, they shall smoke.
- 33. I will sing unto the Lord as long as Í live : I will praise my God while Ĩ hâve my béing.
- 34. And so shall mỹ words please him : my jõy shall bê in the Lord.
- 35. As for sinners, they shall be consumed out of the earth, and the ungodly shall côme to an end: praise thou the Lord, Õ my soul, praise the Lord.

Psalm 105. Confitemini Domino. civ.

- give thanks unto the Lord, and call upon his Name: tell the people what things he hath done.
- 2. O let your songs be of him, and praise him : and let your talking be of all his wondrous works.
- 3. Rejôice în his hóly Name : let the heart of them rējôice that seek the Lord.
- 4. Seek the Lord and his strength: seek his face evermore.
  - 5. Remember the marvellous works

- that hé hath done : his wonders, and the jûdgements of his mouth,
- O ye seed of Abrahâm his sérvant : ye children of Jâcob his chósen.
- 7. Hê îs the Lórd our God : his judgements âre in all the world.
- 8. He hath been alway mindful of his covenant and promise: that he made to a thousand generations;
- 9. Even the covenant that he made with Ábraham: and the oath that he sware unto Ísaac;
- 10. And appointed the same unto Jâcob fór a law : and to Israel for an everlâsting téstament ;
- II. Saying, Unto thee will I give the land of Canaan: the lot of your inheritance;
- 12. When there were yet bût a few of them : and they strângers in the land;
- 13. What time as they went from one nation  $t\hat{\delta}$  an  $\acute{o}$  ther : from one kingdom to  $\~{a}$ n $\acute{o}$ ther people;
- 14. He suffered no man to do them wrong: but reproved even kings for their sakes;
- 15. Touch not mine Anointed : and do mỹ prôphets nó harm.
- 16. Moreover, he called for a dearth upon the land: and destroyed all the provision of bread.
- 17. But he had sent a man before them: even Joseph, who was sold to

- be a bond-sérvant;
- 18. Whose feet they hurt in the stocks: the iron entered into his soul;
- 19. Until the time came thất his cause was known: the word of the Lôrd tried him.
- 20. The king sent, and del iveréd him: the prince of the people let him go free.
- 21. He made him lord a lso of his house : and ruler of all his substance;
- 22. That he might inform his princes âfter his will : and teach his senators wisdom.
- 23. Israel also came into Égypt : and Jacob was a stranger în the land of Ham.
- 24. And he increased his people exceedingly: and made them stronger than their enemies;
- 25. Whose heart turned so, that they hâted his people : and dealt untrulỹ with his sérvants.
- 26. Then sent he Môsēs his sérvant : and Aaron whom hê had chósen.
- 27. And these shewed his tôkēns amóng them : and wondērs în the lánd of Ham.
- 28. He sent dârkness, and it was dark : and they were not obediênt untó his word.
  - 29. He turned their waters into

blood: and slew their fish.

- 30. Their lând brought forth frogs: yea, even în their kings' chámbers.
- 31. He spake the word, and there came all manner of flies : and lice in all their quarters.
- 32. He gave them hail-stones for rain: and flames of fire in their land.
- 33. He smote their vines âlso and fig-trees : and destroyed the trees that were in their coasts.
- 34. He spake the word, and the grasshoppers came, and caterpillars innûmeráble : and did eat up all the grass in their land, and devoured the fruit of their ground.
- 35. He smote all the first-born in their land : even the chief of all their strength.
- 36. He brought them forth also with silver and gold: there was not one feeble person among their tribes.
  - 37. Egypt was glad at their depart-

- ing : for they were afraid of them.
- 38. He spread out a cloud to be a covering : and fire to give light in the night-season.
- 39. At their des i re he brought quails : and he filled them with the bread of heaven.
- 40. He opened the rock of stone, and the waters flowed out : so that rivers ran in the dry places.
- 41. For why? he remembered his holy promise: and Abrāham his sérvant.
- 42. And he brought forth his people with joy : and his chosen with gladness;
- 43. And gave them the lânds of the heathen: and they took the labours of the people în possession;
- 44. That they might keep his státutes : ând obsérve his laws.

#### Psalm 106. Confitemini Domino. cv.

- give thanks unto the Lord, for hê is grácious : and his mercy endûreth for éver.
- 2. Who can express the noble acts of the Lord: or shew forth all his praise?
- 3. Blessed are they that âlway keep júdgement : ând do righteousness.
- 4. Remember me, O Lord, according to the favour that thou bearest untô thy people : O visit me with thŷ salvátion;
- 5. That I may see the felicity of thy chosen: and rejoice in the gladness of thy people, and give thanks with thine inheritance.
- 6. We have sinned with our fathers: we have done amiss, and dealt wickedly.
- 7. Our fathers regarded not thy wonders in Egypt, neither kept they thy great goodness in remembrance: but were disobedient at the sea, even at the Réd sea.
- 8. Nevertheless, he helped them for his Náme's sake : that he might make his power tó be known.
- 9. He rebuked the Red sea also, and it was dried up: so he led them through the deep, as through a wilderness
- 10. And he saved them from the âdversáry's hand : and delivered them

- from the hand of the enemy.
- II. As for those that troubled them, the waters ôverwhélmed them : there was not ône of thém left.
- 12. Then believed they his words : ānd sang praise unto him.
- 13. But within a while they forgat his works: and would not abide his counsel.
- 14. But lust came upon them in the wilderness: and they tempted God in the désert.
- 15. And he gâve them their desire : and sent leanness withâl intó their soul.
- 16. They angered Moses also in the tents: and Aaron the saint of the Lord.
- 17. So the earth opened, and swallowed up Dáthan: and covered the congregation of Ábiram.
- 18. And the fire was kindled in their company : the flame burnt up the ungodly.
- 19. They made a câlf in Hóreb : and worshipped the môlten image.
- 20. Thus they tûrned their glóry: into the similitude of a câlf that eateth hay.
- 21. And they forgat God their Sáviour: who had done so great things in Égypt;
  - 22. Wondrous works in the land of

Ham : and fearful things bŷ the Réd sea.

- 23. So he said, he would have destroyed them, had not Moses his chosen stood before him in the gap: to turn away his wrathful indignation, lest he should destroy them.
- 24. Yea, they thought scorn ôf that pleasant land : and gave no crêdence untó his word ;
- 25. But mûrmûred in their tents : and hearkened not unto the voice of the Lord.
- 26. Then lift he up his hānd a-gainst them: to overthrow them în the wilderness;
- 27. To cast out their seed among the nations: and to scatter them in the lands.
- 28. They joined themselves unto  $B\hat{a}al$ -péor : and ate the  $\hat{o}fferings$  of the dead.
- 29. Thus they provoked him to anger with their own inventions : and the plague was great among them.
- 30. Then stood up Phine es, and prayed: and so the plague ceased.
- 31. And that was counted unto him for righteousness: among all posterities for evermore.
- 32. They angered him also at the waters of strife: so that he punished Moses for their sakes;
  - 33. Because they provôked his spirit :

so that he spake unadvisedly with his lips.

- 34. Neither destroyed they the heathen: as the Lord commanded them;
- 35. But were mingled am ông the heathen: ãnd learned their works.
- 36. Insomuch that they worshipped their idols, which turned to their own decay: yea, they offered their sons and their daughters ûnto dévils;
- 37. And shed innocent blood, even the blood of their sons and ôf their daughters: whom they offered unto the idols of Canaan; and the land was defiled with blood.
- 38. Thus were they stained with their own works : and went a whoring with their own inventions.
- 39. Therefore was the wrath of the Lord kindled against his people: insomuch that he abhorred his ôwn inhéritance.
- 40. And he gave them over into the hand of the heathen: and they that hated them were lords over them.
- 41. Their enemies oppressed them : and had them in subjection.
- 42. Many a time did hê delíver them: but they rebelled against him with their own inventions, and were brought dôwn in their wickedness.
- 43. Nevertheless, when he sâw their adversity: he heard their complaint.
  - 44. He thought upon his covenant,

and pitied them, according unto the multitude  $\hat{\tilde{o}}$  f his mércies : yea, he made all those that led them away câptive to pity them.

45. Deliver us, O Lord our God, and gather us from among the heathen: that we may give thanks unto

thy holy Name, and make our boast of thy praise.

46. Blessed be the Lord God of Israel from everlasting, and world without end: and let all the people say, Amen.

#### Psalm 107. Confitemini Domino. cvj.

- give thanks unto the Lord, for hê is grácious : and his mercy endûreth for éver.
- 2. Let them give thanks whom the Lôrd hãth redeemed : and delivered from the hãnd of the énemy;
- 3. And gathered them out of the lands, from the east, and from the west: from the north, and from the south.
- 4. They went astray in the wilderness out of the way : and found no city to dwell in.
- 5. Hûngrỹ and thírsty: their soul fainted in them.
- 6. So they cried unto the Lôrd in their trouble : and he delivered thêm from their distress.
- 7. He led them forth bỹ the right way: that they might go to the city where they dwelt.
- 8. O that men would therefore praise the Lôrd for his goodness : and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!
  - 9. For he satisfieth the empty soul:

- and filleth the hungrỹ soû l with go'odness.
- 10. Such as sit in darkness, and in the sh a dow of death: being fast bound in misery and iron;
- II. Because they rebelled against the words of the Lord: and lightly regarded the counsel of the most Highest;
- 12. He also brought down their heart through heaviness: they fell down, and there was none to help them.
- 13. So when they cried unto the Lôrd in their trouble : he delivered them out of their distress.
- 14. For he brought them out of darkness, and out of the shadow of death: and brake their bonds in sunder.
- 15. O that men would therefore praise the Lôrd for his goodness: and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!
- 16. For he hath brôken the gates of brass: and smitten the bars of iron in

súnder.

- 17. Foolish men are plâgued for their offence : and because of their wickedness.
- 18. Their soul abhorred all manner of meat: and they were even hard at death's door.
- 19. So when they cried unto the Lôrd in their trouble : he delivered them out of their distress.
- 20. He sent his word, and healed them : and they were saved from their destruction.
- 21. O that men would therefore praise the Lôrd for his goodness: and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!
- 22. That they would offer unto him the sacrifice of thanksgiving : and tell out his works with gladness!
- 23. They that go dôwn to the sea in ships: and occupy their business în great waters;
- 24. These men see the works of the Lord : and his wonders in the deep.
- 25. For at his word the stormy wind ariseth: which lifteth up the waves thereof.
- 26. They are carried up to the heaven, and down ãgáin tó the deep: their soul melteth away becaûse of the trouble.
- 27. They reel to and fro, and stagger like a drunken man: and are at


their wit's end.

- 28. So when they cry unto the Lôrd in their trouble: he delivereth them out of their distress.
- 29. For he mâketh the stórm to cease : so that the waves thereof are still.
- 30. Then are they glad, bec au se they are at rest: and so he bringeth them unto the h a ven where they would be.
- 31. O that men would therefore praise the Lôrd for his goodness: and declare the wonders that he doeth for the children of men!
- 32. That they would exalt him also in the congregation of the people : and praise him in the soat of the élders!
- 33. Who turneth the floods înto a wilderness : and drieth ûp the watersprings.
- 34. A fruitful land mâkēth he bárren : for the wickedness of thêm that dwéll therein.
- 35. Again, he maketh the wilderness a stânding water : and watersprings ôf a drý ground.
- 36. And there he sêttēth the húngry: that they may build them a city to dwéll in;
- 37. That they may sow their lând, and plant vineyards: to yield them fruits of increase.


- 38. He blesseth them, so that they multiplŷ exceedingly : and suffereth not their câttle tó decrease.
- 39. And again, when they are minishêd and brought low: through oppression, through an ỹ plâgue or trouble;
- 40. Though he suffer them to be evil intrêated through týrants : and let them wander out of the wãy în the wilderness;

- 41. Yet helpeth he the poor out of misery: and maketh him households like a flock of sheep.
- 42. The righteous will cons îdēr this, and rejoice: and the mouth of all wickedness shall be stopped.
- 43. Whoso is wise, will ponder these things: and they shall understand the loving-kindness of the Lord.

- 12. O help us against the énemy : for vâin is the hélp of man.
- 13. Through Gôd wẽ shall dó great acts: and it is he that shall trễad down our énemies.

- Old not thy tongue, Õ Gôd óf my praise: for the mouth of the ungodly, yea, the mouth of the deceitful is opened upón me.

- 3. For the love that I had unto them, lo, they take now mỹ côntráry part : but I give mysêlf únto prayer.
- 4. Thus have they rewarded me evil for good: and hatred for my good will.

- 6. When sentence is given upon him, let him bễ condémned : and let his prayer bẽ tûrned into sin.
- 7. Lêt his days be few : and let another take his office.
- 8. Let his chîldren be fátherless : and his wîfe a widow.


- 9. Let his children be vagabonds, and bég their bread : let them seek it also out of desolate places.

- 19. Let it thus happen from the Lord unt  $\hat{o}$  mine é nemies : and to those that speak  $\hat{e}$ vil against my soul.
- 20. But deal thou with me, O Lord God, according unto thy Name: for sweet is thy mercy.
- 21. O deliver me, for I am hêlpless and poor : and my heart is wounded within me.
- 22. I go hence like the shadow thất depárteth : and am driven awãy âs the grásshopper.
- 23. My knees are w eak through fasting: my flesh is dried up for want of fatness.

- 24. I am become also a reproach unto them: they that look upon me shake their heads.
- 25. Hêlp mẽ, O Lórd my God : O save me according tô thy mércy.
- 26. And they shall know, how that this is thy hand: and that thou, Lord, hast done it.
- 27. Though they curse, yet bless thou : and let them be confounded that rise up against me ; but let thy servant réjoice.
- 28. Let mine adversaries be clôthed with shame: and let them cover themselves with their own confûsion, as with a cloke.
- 29. As for me, I will give great thanks unto the Lôrd with my mouth: and praise him among the multitude;
- 30. For he shall stand at the right hand of the poor : to save his soul from unrighteous judges.

2. My doctrine shall drop as the

rain, my speech shall distil as the dew: as the small rain upon the tender herb, and as the showers upon the grass.

- 3. Because I will publish the Nâme of the Lord: ascribe ye greatness unto our God.
- 4. He is the Rock, his work is pérfect : for all his ways are júdgement.
- 5. A God of truth and without iniquity: jûst and right is he.
- 6. They have corrupted themselves, their spot is not the spôt of his children: they are a perverse and crooked gênerátion.
- 7. Do ye thus requite the Lord, O foolish people and unwise: is not he thy Father that hath bought thee? hath he not made thee, and established thee?
- 8. Remember the days of old, consider the years of many generations: ask thy father, and he will shew thee; thy elders, and they will tell thee.
- 9. When the most High divided to the nations their inheritance: when he separated the sons of Ádam.
- 10. He set the bounds of the people : according to the number of the children of Israel.
- II. For the Lord's portion is his people: Jacob is the lot of his inheritance.
- 12. He found him in a desert land, and in the waste howling wilderness: he led him about, he instructed him, he kept him as the apple of his eye.
  - 13. As an eagle stirreth up her nest,

- fluttereth over her young, spreadeth abroad her wings, taketh them, beareth them on her wings: so the Lord alone did lead him, and there was no strange god with him.
- 14. He made him ride on the high places of the earth, that he might eat the increase of the fields: and he made him to suck honey out of the rock, and oil out of the flinty rock.
- 15. Butter of kine, and milk of sheep: with fat of lambs, and rams of the breed of Basan,
- 16. And goats, with the fat of kidneys of wheat : and thou didst drink the pure blood of the grape.
- 17. But Jeshurun waxed fat, and kicked: thou art waxen fat, thou art grown thick, thou art covered with fatness;
- 18. Then he fors ook God which made him: and lightly esteemed the Rock of his salvation.
- 19. They provoked him to jealousy with strange gods: with abominations provoked they him to anger.
- 20. They sacrificed unto devils, not to God: to gods whom they knew not, to new gods that came newly up, whom your fathers feared not.
- 21. Of the Rock that begat thee thou art unmindful: and hast forgotten God that formed thee.
  - 22. And when the Lord saw it, hễ

abhorred them : because of the provoking of his sons, and of his daughters.

- 23. And he said, I will hide my face from them, I will see what their end shall be: for they are a very froward generation, children in whom is no faith.
- 24. They have moved me to jealousy with that which is not God: they have provoked me to anger with their vanities;
- 25. And I will move them to jealousy with those which are not a people: I will provoke them to anger with a foolish nation.
- 26. For a fire is kindled in mine anger, and shall burn unto the lowest hell: and shall consume the earth with her increase, and set on fire the foundations of the mountains.
- 27. I will heap mischiefs upon them : I will spend mine arrows upon them.
- 28. They shall be burnt with hunger : and devoured with burning heat, and with bitter destruction.
- 29. I will also send the teeth of beasts upon them: with the poison of serpents of the dust.
- 30. The sword without, and terror within, shall destroy both the young man and the virgin: the suckling also with the man of gray hairs.
  - 31. I said, I would scatter them into


- córners: I would make the remembrance of them to cease from among men.
- 32. Were it not that I feared the wrâth of the énemy: lest their adversaries should beh a ve themselves strangely:
- 33. And lest they should say, Our hand is high: and the Lord hath not done all this.
- 34. For they are a nation void of counsel: neither is there any understanding in them.
- 35. O that they were wise, that they  $\hat{u}$  nderst ood this: that they would consider their latter end!
- 36. How should one chase a thousand, and two put ten thousand to flight: except their Rock had sold them, and the Lord had shut them up?
- 37. For their rock is not as our Rock: even our enemies themselves being júdges.
- 38. For their vine is of the vine of Sódom: and of the fields of Gomórrah.
- 39. Their grapes are grapes of gall : their clûsters are bitter.
- 40. Their wine is the pôison of drágons: and the cruel venom of asps.
- 41. Is not this laid up in store with me, and sealed up among my treasures: to me belongeth vengeance and

récompense.


- 42. Their foot shall slide in due time; for the day of their calâmity is at hand: and the things that shall come upon them make haste.
- 43. For the Lord shall judge his people, and repent himself for his servants: when he seeth that their power is gone, and there is none shut up, or left.
- 44. And he shall say, Where are their gods, their rock in whôm they trústed: which did eat the fat of their sacrifices, and drank the wine of their drink offerings? let them rise up and help you, and bê your protéction.
- 45. See now that Î, even Í, am he: and there is no gód with me.
- 46. I kill, and I make alive; Ĩ wound and I heal: neither is there any that can delīver out of my hand.


- 47. For I lift up my hand to heaven : and say, I live for ever.

- 50. And that with the blood of the slain and ôf the cáptives: from the beginning of revenges ũpôn the énemy.
- 51. Rejoice, O ye nations, with his people : for he will avenge the blood of his sérvants;
- 52. And will render vengeance to his âdversáries : and will be merciful unto his land, ãnd tô his people.
