
Let his name be bles-sed for ev-ermore : his name conti-nu-eth before the sun.

Blessed be the Lord, the  $\overset{347}{\text{God}}$  of Is-rael : who alone doth won-derful things.



Have re-gard to thy co-venant: for they that are the obscure of the earth have been filled with dwel-lings of iniquity.





They kept not the co-venant of God : and in his law they would not walk.

And they for-got his be-nefits : and his wonders that he had shewn them.

Wonderful things did he do in the sight of their fathers, in the land of Egypt : in the field of Tanis.

How often did they provoke him in the desert : and move him to wrath in the  $^{457}$   $^{168}$   $^{23}$  place with-out water ?

And they turned back and temp-ted God : and grieved the ho-ly one of Israel.

They re-member-ed not his hand : in the day that he redeemed them from the hand of him that afflicted them :

How he wrought his signs in Egypt : and his wonders in the field of Tanis.

And he turned their rivers in-to blood : and their show-ers that they might not drink.

He sent amongst them divers sorts of flies, which de-vour-ed them : and frogs which destroyed them.

And he gave up their fruits to the blast : and their la-bours to the locust.

And he destroyed their vineyards with hail : and their mulber-ry trees with hoarfrost.

And he gave up their cattle to the hail : and their stock to the fire.

And he sent upon them the wrath of his indignation; indignation and wrath and trouble: which he sent by e-vil angels.

He made a way for a path to his anger : he spared not their souls from death, and their cat-tle he shut up in death.

And he killed all the firstborn in the land of Egypt : the firstfruits of all their labour in the ta-ber-na-cles of Cham.

And he took away his own people as sheep : and guided them in the wil-der-ness like a flock.

And he brought them out in hope and they fear-ed not : and the sea over-

And he brought them into the mountain of his sanctu-ary: the mountain which his right hand had purchased.

And he cast out the Gen-tiles be-fore them : and by lot divided to them their land by a line of dis-tribution.

were turned a-side as a crooked bow.

They provoked him to anger on their hills : and moved him to jealou-sy with their graven things.  $^{23}$ 

God heard, and des-pis-ed them : and he reduced Israel exceedingly as it were to nothing.  $^{4}$   $^{15678}$   $^{23}$ 

And he put away the taber-na-cle of Silo : his tabernacle where he dwelt among men.

And he delivered their strength in-to cap-ti-vity : and their beauty into the hands  $^{168}$   $^{23}$  of the enemy.

And he shut up his people under the sword : and he despis-ed his inheritance.

Fire con-sum-ed their young men: and their maidens were not lamented.

Their priests fell by the sword : and their wi-dows did not mourn.

And the Lord was awaked as one out of sleep : and like a mighty man that hath been sur-fei-ted with wine.

And he smote his enemies on the hin-der parts : he put them to an ev-er-last-ing reproach.
