They called upon the Lord, and he heard them : he spoke to them in the pil-lar of the cloud.





The man that in private de-tract-ed his neighbour : him did I persecute.


With him that had a proud eye, and an un-sati-a-ble heart :  $\frac{4}{15678}$   $\frac{15678}{23}$  would not eat.

And are mindful of his com-mandments :  $\frac{4}{}$  15678 23 to do them.


The Lord hath prepared his throne in heaven : and his king-dom shall rule over all.

Because he remember-ed his ho-ly word : which he had spoken to his ser-vant Abraham.


And he brought forth his people with joy: and his chos-en with gladness.

Praise his peo-ple, ye nations : for he will revenge the blood of his servants :


