I. Minutes of the meeting of September 15th, 2020

It was duly moved and seconded, 'that Graduate Council approve the minutes of the meeting of September 15th as set out in the document.'

II. Business arising

III. Report from the Vice-Provost and Dean of Graduate Studies

Dr. Welch reported on the following items:

- That the October 15th extension had come and gone and now the team was processing and getting everything ready for convocation and government count;
- International graduate student arrival, noting that Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) has now said that that as of October 20th, international students with study permits would be declared essential travel and that for people to arrive at a given university, a quarantine plan for institution needs to be approved by the province. The hope is that McMaster's plan will be approved in the next round;
- The task force for virtual learning, which includes broad representation and is intended to alleviate the burden for students and faculty with respect to virtual learning.

Council members discussed whether or not new study permits have been issued as well as the situation for January and May admits. In response to a question Dr. Welch confirmed that students won't be allowed to arrive with a permit.

IV. Report from the Graduate Associate Deans

Dr. Hanna (Faculty of Health Sciences) reported on the following items:

- A program open house on November 10th, including presentations and Q&A;
- IQAP heavy year;

- The selection process for new director and co-director of the School of Biomedical Engineering;
- Pressure to find clinical placements in the Spring/Summer term, noting that a lot of clinical partners have really come around;
- The importance of the continuation of the return to research plan.

Dr. Hicks (Faculty of Science) reported on the following items:

• The development of a peer review training workshop module within the Faculty.

DESCRIBE THE **EXISTING** REQUIREMENT/PROCEDURE:

Currently the calendar does not offer a WIL stream. Instead two courses are available into which students enroll when taking a coop position.

PROVIDE A DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF THE RECOMMENDED CHANGE (Attach additional pages if space is not sufficient.) As part of the IQAP review, the report made the following recommendation.

The Work integrated learning (WIL) stream in either the M.A. in Economics, the M.A. in Economic Policy or the PhD in Economics Degree

Students in any graduate program of the Economics Department who have obtained a GPA of B or higher at the time of application and a grade of B+ or higher in ECON 761 OR ECON 6G03 may apply to be moved from the regular stream of their program to the work integrated learning (WIL) stream associated with their degree program. The number of students who will be accepted into the WIL stream of the relevant program will be small and may change over time. Admission to the stream does not guarantee a placement. Working with information available to the department and through their own efforts and contacts, a WIL stream student will compete for and apply for positions on their own. These positions can be held anywhere in the world. To complete the WIL stream, students must work in either one or two placements and successfully complete both ECON 796 and ECON 797. A student who fails to complete both courses will be switched back to the regular stream of the program that they are enrolled in. Both of these courses are for credit and are Pass/Fail. Registration in these courses will be restricted to students who have a placement that has been approved by the Econ 796 or Econ 797 course instructor as appropriate. In addition, PhD students must get permission from their supervisor. PhD students will normally enter the WIL stream having passed all comprehensive examinations as well as the research paper. A placement must include a significant research opportunity. At the completion of four months of a placement, the student must write an academic report discussing the work undertaken in light of their academic studies and must request a letter of evaluation from the mentor(s). These documents must be judged satisfactory by the course instructor to successfully complete either ECON 796 or ECON 797 as appropriate. Successful completion of these courses will be indicated on the student's transcript. In the event that the student does not complete the full term of a placement, the student will drop the course and join the regular stream of their program.

Interested Masters students should normally register for the WIL stream associated with their Masters program (MA or MAEP) at the beginning of term 2 of the first year of their program. Because of the nature of hiring, it is sometimes not known which students will be doing each placement until the month before that placement commences. Students who do not find a position can switch back into the regular stream of their program. Students taking Econ 796 or Econ 797 by working at a placement while still enrolled in other courses are expected to fulfill requirements of these other

courses outside their placement work hours. While registered in either ECON 796 or ECON 797, a									
student will be considered a full-time student and will pay term tuition.									
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RATIONALE FOR THE RECOMMENDED CHANGE (How does the requirement fit into the department's program and/or tie to existing Program Learning Outcomes from the program's IQAP cyclical review?):									
Opportunities for work integrated learning are a key part of our PLOs. They are highly prized by our students and have been part of our programming for many years. These changes formalize and bring into alignment with university definitions, what used to be called our coop opportunities. The WIL stream will allow students to demonstrate on their transcript their choice to acquire WIL. Moreover, the associated courses will be covered under tuition, be OSAP eligible and satisfy the evolving requirements of the federal government which is the main employer of our students for summer coop/ paid internship positions.

MA students must pass Econ 765, 721, 723 761 and 762. In addition, they must pass 4 additional courses, two of which may be from outside the department.
PROVIDE A DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF THE RECOMMENDED CHANGE (Attach additional pages if space is not sufficient.) As part of the IQAP review, the report made the following recommendation.
All M.A. in Economics students who are not in the WIL stream will be required to take a course, Econ 7XX in the spring /summer term in addition to the above listed courses. In this course they will apply the tools and material learned in the program to a research topic of their choice, leading to the writing of a research paper.
RATIONALE FOR THE RECOMMENDED CHANGE (How does the requirement fit into the department's
program and/or tie to existing Program Learning Outcomes from the program's IQAP cyclical review?):
We believe that the current system in which some students write term papers in their courses while others do not, needs to be streamlined so that all students get some form of training and practice in producing research reports. Students will be better served by a course that allows additional time over a four month period in the spring/summer term than one in which they try to hurry the project through while preparing for classes and exams and in the midst of learning new techniques during the Fall and Winter courses. This additional time will also allow the instructor to develop some core principles around how Economic research should be done. Additional details can be found in the documents specific to the course.

The proposed change arises out of a long review of faculty research specializations, student consultations and a review of comprehensive examination offerings and procedures across Canada. This list arose out of a periodic survey of faculty research areas since there had been several retirements and new hires since the last review. The optional areas are those that can be reasonable staffed subject to leaves. Students have asked for a greater variety of comprehensive examination areas and students are all levels (MA, PhD pre and post comprehensive) are enthused by the new areas.

The proposed change arises out of a long review of faculty research specializations, student consultations, and a review of comprehensive examination offerings and procedures across Canada.

All faculty hold expertise in at least one of the department's core research areas and they will continue to serve on at least one core comprehensive area examination committee. The specialized areas can directly draw from faculty specific research expertise. Each of the proposed areas are sub-disciplines in Sociology but cannot be staffed continuously and subject to faculty availability. Students who are likely to write these optional examinations can work with their supervisors within the Departments' existing course/comprehensive schedule options to avoid conflict with planned leaves.

Students for their part have requested more comprehensive examination areas tied specifically to their dissertation research areas. Students were fully included within the review of the proposed changes.
